NO MOTIVE GIVEN IN SUICIDE NOTE

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Jan. 27.—(AP)—In a letter written by Edward L. Edwards, former United States senator and governor of New Jersey, before he shot himself Sunday night, no explanation of his suicide was found today. The note was found on a dresser in the room in which he fired the fatal shot. It was addressed to his daughter Elizabeth and his son, Edward, Jr., and directed their attention to his insurance papers and business affairs. It closed: "Good-bye—Dad."
