

VISITOR PROPOSES ORGANIZATION FOR LURE OF TOURISTS

Before he became "mountain struck," Otto L. Haese, attorney and counselor-at-law, practiced in Portland and in 1902 he decided that he would enjoy life to a greater extent if he lived in the mountains. Then it was that he moved to Mount Shasta City.

Mr. Haese, who had cataracts on his eyes, had them removed, and was in Medford yesterday having glasses fitted. He is vitally interested in the development of a booster organization linking southern Oregon and northern California.

His idea, as expressed while here yesterday, is to call a meeting of a chamber of commerce officials and leaders of civic organizations of the cities concerned. A "boosting meeting" would be called in Medford so that plans could be made to attract tourists to this section of the country.

"You can see that I am not interested in this because of selfish desires, but because I think this section has been passed by the nation knowing of the beauties here," he added.

Mr. Haese is 72 years old, and is a striking figure with his ironed cane, walking about the hotel. His hair is white, and he has a snow-white beard and mustache.

"I know Medford when it was a small town," he said, "and one reason why I am so interested in its development is that San Francisco grew in practically the same manner."

He outlined a plan whereby tourists would visit Red Bluff, journey to Mt. Lassen, then to Mt. Shasta and McLeod. From there they would visit Castle Crags, Mount Shasta City and Yreka. Tourists would then come to the Rogue River valley to fish, visit Crater Lake, and then return south by Klamath Falls.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 28.—(AP)—W. H. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray now is concerned over mundane influences faced by supreme court justices of Oklahoma.

His proposal to erect a bunkhouse for legislators on the state-house lawn has a companion in a plan, announced last night, to move the court outside the capitol.
