

### DAMAGES SOUGHT BY MRS. JEROME

## TO EMPLOY HOME FOLK ON SCHOOLS

Local Labor and Material Specified in Contracts—Statement By Board Defines Status of Workers—Will Issue Cards.

The school board, through a statement released today by Supt. E. H. Hedrick, again reiterated its determination to use local labor and materials in so far as possible in constructing new school buildings which will go to bids within the next few days. Causes requiring this are being written into all contracts. Local labor is defined in the school board's statements as follows: "First—Persons actually having residence within the limits of school district No. 49 on December 1, 1930.

tion of the school buildings, it shall appear to the contractor that outside labor should be brought in either because of a shortage of home labor or because of the need of some special type of labor which cannot be supplied within the school district, such contractor shall appear before the school board or its representative and make his showing. If in the opinion of the school board the contention of the contractor is justified, the board will either supply the labor locally or allow the contractor to bring in the needed labor. Each and every laborer or employe brought in from the outside, however, must be approved by the school board for cause and a record kept in the school office of all such employes, open to inspection by any citizen of the school district.

"The school board of district 49, Jackson county, Oregon, further announces, that on all bids on work, or materials needed or to be used in the construction or equipment of its school buildings, that it will favor local contractors, merchants or tradespeople by granting to them on any and all bids entered in competition with outside bidders a margin of 5 per cent of the lowest bidder's bid, or such an amount thereof as may be necessary to throw the bid to the local man.

"In its effort to favor local labor, local contractors and local materials, the school board surrenders none of its prerogatives. It will not be unkind of the interests of the taxpayers nor its highest duty to the schools.

"In the case of 'holdups' or what the board considers unreasonable demands, or prices, or conditions imposed whether on the part of labor, local contractors, or local furnishers of material, the board reserves the right to revoke promptly any or all favor clauses in this statement of position, which are being abused, and throw the matter open to outside competition on an even basis, if that should become necessary to protect the proper interests of the taxpayers and the schools."

"All persons employed by any contractor or other person to do work or perform service in connection with the erection, alteration or equipping of any school building within the school district will secure such employment only upon presentation of a card obtained from the office of the school board identifying him as local labor, and no contractor or other employer shall engage any person for employment in connection with the construction or equipping of any school building unless such person shall first present a labor identification card secured from the school office.

"A local labor identification card will be issued by the school office to any person qualified to hold one. Persons not known to the school office must be identified by someone who is known to it. The cards are not transferable and may be revoked at any time if secured by misrepresentation or if the status of the holder changes. The possession of a local labor identification card does not guarantee employment to any one but is necessary before employment may be secured. When equally competent, available and willing to work married men with children will receive first consideration when employment is given by the school district.

## ROGUE PASTORS DEPLORE DEATH SAM PRESCOTT

Statement Issued By Association Says Officer Was Example and Inspiration in Community.

The following statement of position of the Rogue River Valley Ministerial association concerning the killing of Sam Prescott, Ashland police officer, was issued Monday by the ministers:

"We deplore, beyond expression, the ruthless, cold-blooded murder of this splendid young officer of the law. We have watched with pride and growing interest his fearless, cool and sane execution of his office. He has been an example to many of his older fellow officers, and an inspiration to many of our younger men. The community, the county, the state and the nation has suffered a severe loss in his untimely death.

"We more deeply deplore the influences which help to make a thing like this possible, or probable. We cry out against the growing disrespect for law and law enforcement and insist that there should be no favors shown in the strict administration of law. We feel that every man and every woman who has, in any way, contributed to this spirit of disrespect for law and order is in the same measure of that disrespect, responsible for such tragedies.

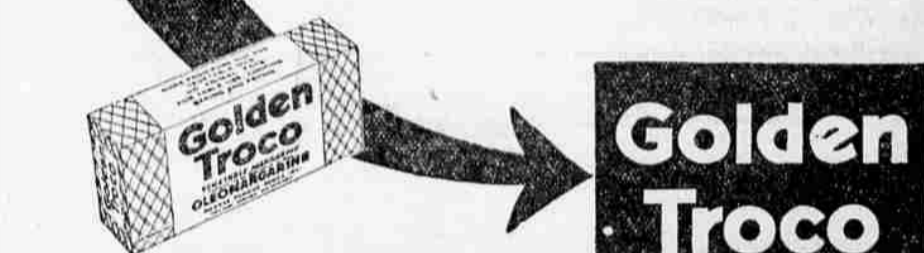
"We wish to say to the officers of the law in this district that we are fully in sympathy with every lawful effort they make to enforce our laws, and that we pledge them our hearty support and moral backing in their great task of bringing criminals to justice. We believe that the incident will have the effect of inspiring greater determination on their part, and in striving the entire community to greater concern.

"We especially wish to express to the parents and other relatives of Mr. Prescott our deepest sympathy and love. We feel your loss. We know that it can not be restored. We appreciate the great contribution which you have made to the cause of righteous government. We can only take you more fully into our hearts, and pray for the grace of God to sustain you.

"We appeal to the members of our several churches to give themselves unstintingly to co-operation with officers of the law in their efforts to sustain good government, and to leave nothing undone to help create a constructive, progressive spirit of righteous government everywhere."

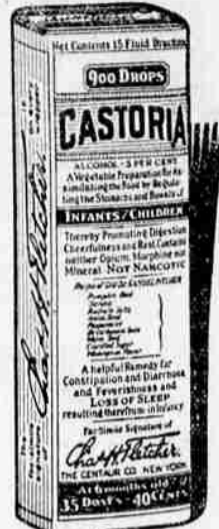

### Special Recipes

**Cheese Sauce**  
2 tablespoons butter  
4 tablespoons flour  
2 cups milk  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Few grains pepper  
1 cup American grated cheese  
Melt butter in saucepan, add flour mixed with seasonings and stir until well blended, pour on the milk and stir constantly, cooking until thick. Then add the cheese which has been carefully grated, and cook slowly until the cheese is melted.

Parboil a leg of pork and remove the skin. Cut with butter, sprinkle with powdered sage, salt, pepper, bread crumbs, and finely minced onion. Roast in a moderate oven until tender and nicely browned. Bake a well-seasoned bread dressing in the pan with the pork. Serve with fried apple rings, Baked Cabbage and Tomatoes—A

**Fine Combination**  
3 cups chopped cooked cabbage  
1 1/2 cups well-seasoned tomato sauce  
1 cup bread cheese  
1 cup bread crumbs  
Salt  
Pepper  
Put alternate layers of tomato and cabbage in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle each layer with cheese and crumbs, salt, and pepper. Dot top with bits of butter and bake in a slow oven (300 degrees Fahrenheit) until thoroughly heated and slightly browned—20 to 30 minutes. **Individual Mock Venison Pies**  
3 pounds round steak  
1 teaspoon salt  
Pepper  
3 tablespoons flour  
2 cups carrots, sliced  
1/2 cup turnips, sliced  
1 cup potatoes, cubed  
6 small onions  
Cut beef into one-inch cubes. Sprinkle with salt, pepper, and flour. Fry in a little fat until browned. Cover with boiling water and cook one hour. Add carrots, onions, and turnips and cook fifteen minutes longer. Thicken gravy with a little flour smoothed in cold water. Add potatoes and pour into individual ramekins. Cover each with a crust of flaky pastry. Bake in a hot oven (450 degrees Fahrenheit) for ten minutes, then reduce the heat to 325 degrees Fahrenheit, and cook for forty minutes longer.
