

ROSENBERG SPRAY PLANT INCREASED FOR OIL PRODUCT

The Bear Creek Spray Company, Inc., owned and operated by the Rosenberg Brothers of the Bear Creek orchards, has started work on its plant to include oil mistifying operations along with the manufacture of lime sulphur spray.

Construction of mistifying shed and installation of the necessary machinery is now under way. It will manufacture both dormant and summer oils and be ready for the coming season with a daily capacity of 5000 gallons, or one carload.

Local emulsification will give orchardists a fresh supply and eliminate the present barrel freight costs. Oil will be shipped in carload lots for use at the plant.

The lime spray department is now in operation and some improvements are being made. It is patronized by a large percentage of the valley orchardists resulting in a substantial saving to the growers. The lime used is from the J. M. Lively lime fields near Gold Hill and the sulphur is shipped from the Louisiana sulphur mines.

Close to a dozen men are employed by both projects. The residue is used as fertilizer.

The present modern plant, representing an investment of \$20,000, had its inception in an iron kettle in the middle of the Bear Creek orchard ten years ago, in which the Rosenberg brothers made their first batch of home-made lime sulphur spray.

A more shop worn and hackneyed part than Garbo's could scarcely be imagined—Camille, Sapho, Zara, and what have you! Yet Garbo gives the character freshness, charm—and above all DISTINCTION.

Yes, THAT, we have an idea, is the dominant Garbo note—DISTINCTION. She stands out above all others, regardless of her part—regardless of what she does. True, she is a genuine artist, intelligent, deft, restrained—but her hold on one Garbo fan at least is something more than that—she is Garbo no one, nothing quite like her. Outstanding, unique, sophisticated, distinguished!

"Inspiration" brings these facts out more strongly than Garbo's recent efforts, for as a play it is decidedly old stuff. We can think of no other star on the screen, with the possible exception of Gloria Swanson, who could have raised the role from the hopelessly reminiscent and commonplace, as Garbo did last night.

And, as usual, she was the whole show. This is no reflection upon her support which was excellent—the final scene between Lewis Stone and his mistress being one of the best things we have seen in many a long day—but take Garbo out of "Inspiration" and where would you be?
