A dramatic club is being organized in connection with the department and officers to head the club will be elected at a meeting tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Students of other schools are invited to take the course and Mrs. Kelly will give private lessons in dramatic art to students who are unable to enroll in the regular classes. She is well qualified as an instructor, having secured her degree in dramatic art, upon graduation at the University of Washington and also holds a certificate entitling her to give dramatic instruction in all grades.

She has acted with four professional companies including Henry Duffy players, Forrest Taylor company, Lawrence Marsh company of San Diego and Alfred Cross company of the same city. While at the University of Washington she produced numerous dramas, and directed several of her own productions in Seattle.

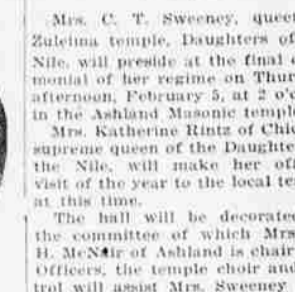
