SOUTHERN OREGON HISTORY IN RADIO PROGRAMS, PLAN

Historical programs, based upon the romantic development of the Oregon country, being broadcast for all leading cities of the state by the Guardian Building and Loan association, will include the history of southern Oregon, it was announced today by Mason H. Moltzner, Portland, March 4, and John H. Weiser of Roseburg. Constantine company, who are calling on Hamilton Patron, manager of the Medford office of Guardian Building and Loan.

The stirring radio drama which will relate the history of southern Oregon, will be broadcast from station KOEN, Portland, March 4, and a hook-up with The Mail Tribune-Virgin station, KMED, will be effected if possible.

The southern Oregon program will carry the little town of Jacksonville through the mining days including the most adventuresome stories, treasured by local pioneers. Special emphasis will also be given the Table Rock story and the development of Medford, leading city of southern Oregon.

Mr. Moltzner and Mr. Weiser are working with Mrs. Patton today to obtain information from local citizens concerning the early days in southern Oregon. It will be impossible to interview many pioneers today and for that reason they have requested that early settlers who have data on the subject, stories of the Indian wars and the mining days, as well as the first settlements made here, send them in letters to Mr. Moltzner, Guardian Building and Loan office, Third and Alder streets, Portland.

Mr. Moltzner has had much experience in dramatics on the legitimate stage and in radio work and promises that the broadcasts will be interesting from a dramatic as well as historical viewpoint.
