

UTAH SKI STAR MAKES RECORD 243 FOOT LEAP

All Engen Going 95 Miles Per Hour at Takeoff—Three Jumpers Exceed Old Record.

BIG PINES, Cal., Feb. 2.—(AP)—All Engen, of Salt Lake City, Utah made 243 feet of a new world's record of 243 feet today on the snow-covered ski jump here, where the southern California winter sports carnival ended yesterday.

Surviving down the 790-foot runway of the new jump, the world's highest, at an estimated speed of 95 miles an hour, Engen glided off the brink and made a perfect landing.

On three of his four official jumps in competition in the \$1000 professional ski jumping event, Engen exceeded the recognized world's record of 229 feet, set by Henry Hall, of Detroit, at Quebec in 1925. Once he jumped 231 feet and on his last try he made 243 feet.

Two others exceeded the old world mark, Lars Haugen, of Lake Tahoe, Cal., and Halvor Hvalstad, cleared the same distance on his final leap.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 2.—(AP) It was the crowd, not the ski jumpers, that broke the records at the first Pacific northwest title tournament yesterday at Government Camp on Mount Hood's foothills. Traffic officers estimated the number of spectators at 15,000, by far the largest throng ever to turn out to a winter sport event here. Automobiles were parked on both sides of the highway for five miles, officers said.

John Elvrum of the sponsoring Cascade Ski club, Portland, won the class A jump with a 128-foot mark.

Hjalmar Hvam, Cascade club, was named cross country champion. The course for that event was about nine miles and Hvam's time was 1:10:35.

MEDFORD HIGH SEEKING GAME FOR WEEK END

With Rod and Gun

A special United States wildlife committee, investigating wild life conditions in the nation, has returned an interesting report, filled with statistics. The report was recently released for publication and appeared in the Portland press.

The committee finds that the evidence all points to a rapid decline of wild life and a rapid and continuous increase of interest in hunting, fishing and other outdoor recreation.

"Your committee is of the opinion that it is not too late," reads the report, "to formulate and apply conservation policies that will yet insure, not merely a maintenance of existing supplies of birds, animals and fishes, but will produce an increase in these resources so that future generations of Americans may profit by this wholesome recreation even beyond our present opportunities."

"It is conservatively estimated that there is a 400 per cent increase during the last decade in the number of people who enjoyed the pastimes of hunting and fishing."

"Figures of the recent census show that the value of sporting firearms sold to the public during the year 1929 amounted to \$21,970,267; the value of ammunition was \$42,779,929; the value of fishing tackle was \$25,000,000."

"It has been estimated that sportsmen in 1929 spent an average of \$50 apiece in equipment for shooting and fishing, including their purchases of ammunition, firearms and fishing tackle, as well as clothing, tents, canoes and motorboats. When we take into consideration the large number of articles that enter into a day's sport, the estimate of \$50 per annum seems reasonable as an average annual figure."

"Even at this low figure the amount sportsmen invest each year in this way at \$50 apiece for 13,000,000 people equals \$650,000,000. If we include the cost of transportation, wear and tear on automobiles going to and from the shooting grounds, the total expenditure of the citizens of the United States in their quest for outdoor recreation in shooting and fishing alone during 1929 would doubtless amount to fully three-quarters of a billion dollars."

"These estimates concern only those values realized in the pursuit of wild birds, animals and fishes for food and sport. By far the greater proportion of Americans who annually go afield to enjoy our wild life resources and the associations of the out-of-doors, do not either shoot game or catch fish for sport. But all of these, nevertheless, are interested in wild life. Their numbers are annually increasing."

"For example, in 1929, 2,000,597 persons visited the national park areas alone and in 1926, 2,774,561 visited these same areas. The National Association of State Parks indicates that one park area in the state of New York was visited by 13,000,000 people in 1930. Park areas in Michigan were visited during the same time by 8,900,000; in Connecticut by 1,428,514, and in Indiana by 950,000."

Cougars in Running

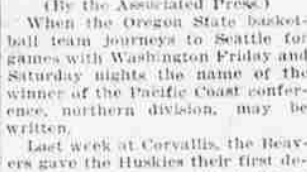

ESPINOZA WINS FIRST MONEY IN TEXAS TOURNEY

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Feb. 2.—(AP)—Abe Espinoza, veteran Spanish professional at the Medina Country club, won \$1500 richer today, the result of three sparkling rounds of sub-par golf in the tenth annual Texas open tournament.

The elder of the two golfing Espinosas, who lost his last important tournament in 1928, the west-end open, mastered the difficult Blackbridge park course with rounds of 62-74-69-63—281, to beat out his closest rivals, Harry Cooper, Frank Walsh and Joe Turnesa, by two strokes.
