

# PENNSYLVANIA CUTS EMPHASIS ON ATHLETES

### President Takes Over Full Control—Spring Training, Camps And Tables Are Abolished.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 3.—(AP)—The entire athletic structure at the University of Pennsylvania will be reorganized upon a basis of simplicity and "under-emphasis" in the most drastic upheaval of eastern intercollegiate sports history.

Control and management of athletics have been taken over completely by Thomas S. Gates, president of the university, and his board of trustees while the sports themselves will be given back to the students.

The present all-powerful council on athletics, composed of alumni, students and faculty, will be abolished.

Coaches In Faculty  
Spring and pre-season training in football, training camps, training tables, dormitories for athletes, as well as scholarships, beyond that won in the classroom, have been wiped out.

In a 23-page bulletin published today, President Gates announced these changes, and accepted the report of an investigating committee.

Has the Build  
Short on experience, Joe is long on build. Among well known grapplers who have cast a critical eye over the Savoldi structural features, to place the old stamp of approval thereon, is Everett Marshall, La Junta, Colo., star.

## With Rod and Gun

How many miles is your car getting per deer? This may sound like a ridiculous question but have you ever stopped to consider the important part that hunting plays in the industries other than those connected with your immediate outfitting?

It is a difficult task to arrive at any reasonable figure on this problem because of the excessive automobile travel in this state. However, at the main office of the California Division of Fish and Game in San Francisco, a method has been devised, through the checking of deer tags, whereby a fairly accurate account can be given of the fellow who got the deer.

In tabulating maps at the division it was noted that hunters from southern California traveled to all corners of the state in a search of the antlered tribe. Hunters from the northern part of the state traveled no farther south than Inyo, Kern and Los Angeles counties.

With the hunters of the south showing the largest and widest percentage of travel this account has to do with their problem.

First, there were 21,222 deer legally killed last year in California. Figures show that of this number 10,135 bucks were bagged by local residents in their respective territories. Los Angeles hunting bagged 2139 animals thus leaving 8888 deer for the rest of the state.

The report is too lengthy to give a full account per county of the deer taken by Los Angeles hunters; therefore just a few representative figures have been taken.

Los Angeles hunters bagged one deer in Alameda county, with a round trip estimate of 360 miles. In Tulare county they bagged 273 bucks at 350 miles per animal. Modoc county registered 46 deer at 2000 miles per animal. For Siskiyou there is 21 deer at 1500 miles; Nevada county, 4 deer at 1100 miles; Plumas county, 42 bucks at 1500 miles; Mendocino county, 50 deer at 1200 miles; Riverside county, 161 deer at 200 miles; San Diego county, 8 deer at 200 miles; Orange county, 16 deer at 150 miles, and Los Angeles county 656 deer at 100 miles per animal.

It will be noted that the mileage figures quoted are estimated for round trips. These figures do not represent the numbers of Los Angeles hunters who actually participated in hunting in the counties recorded; for instance one deer killed in Alameda county represents one hunter, although there may have been several or dozens from the south who hunted that territory but did not meet with success.

It can be seen at a glance that a large sum of money is expended each season not only for oil, gas, tires and other accessories but also

for food and shelter along the route.

For those who like to juggle with figures perhaps the above data will be the means of opening a new field for interesting calculations. Perhaps as it stands it may stimulate the imagination of the reader and bring realization that there is more to this hunting and fishing game than merely grabbing a gun or reel and disappearing into the mountains.

Dead trees hold a very important place in the conservation of our wild life, according to reports from several bird societies throughout the country.

These trees provide homes and hiding places for many of our insectivorous birds. Birds are known to migrate from one locality to another in order to find suitable nesting places in hollow stumps and limbs.

By proper planning the dead trees can be made to give artistic value to the land as well as suitable bird havens. Climbing vines can be grown to cover the barrenness of the trees and excessive limbs can be removed.

# SPORT SLANTS

"Unless I am mistaken," writes Gene Gunning, sports editor of the Morgantown (W. Va.) Post, "the 1920 Dartmouth team you referred to as beating the University of Washington, was coached by Dr. Clarence Wiley Spears, former Dartmouth star, who has since coached with success at West Virginia four years; Minnesota four years; and now at the University of Oregon."

"Jackson Cannell, I believe, was on the Dartmouth staff in some capacity in 1920, but Spears was the 'head man.' It was because of some difference of opinion with Cannell or Jess Hawley that Spears decided to leave Dartmouth and accept a flattering offer from West Virginia.

"Spears started his four-year regime at West Virginia in 1921. His 1922 team was undefeated and downed Gonzaga university, coached by Gus Dorais, now of Detroit, and one of the outstanding teams on the coast that season, in a post-season game at San Diego, Cal.

"Thus I think you'll find it was Spears who coached Dartmouth in '20 and also that the East's last victory was gained by a Spears-West Virginia team in 1922. West Virginia is located at Morgantown, in the middle of the Alleghenies and about four or five miles below the Mason and Dixon line, but it plays an eastern schedule in nearly all sports and desires to be regarded as an eastern team."

"Next fall, by the way, West Virginia enters a new football regime under Earle (Greney) Neale, one of the few major league ball players to make good as a college football coach."

Mr. Gunning is quite correct—on both counts. Jackson Cannell was not head coach at Dartmouth in 1920, as we reported, but merely an assistant. He took over the head coaching job in 1921, yielded the post to Jess Hawley in 1923 and returned to it in 1929, to serve a second term.

The honors, on behalf of the East, go to West Virginia's band of Mountaineers.

Bill Roper may "counsel" with the University of Virginia in football matters, having an interest in the southern school as the outgrowth of student days there, but the retired Princeton head coach has no idea of continuing active work at any college this year.

"I think I have earned a rest," Roper said at the meeting of football coaches in New York, where he led the fight for endorsement of much-needed reforms in the conduct of the sport. "So far as I know now I am through with coaching. I've done my share of it for something like 20 years. I had good seasons and bad, so anything I say can't be held against me."

However, I still have the best interests of the game at heart and I intend to do everything I can to further them, no matter what my active connections may be in the future."

# KING TUT PUTS PETROLLE OUT IN FIRST ROUND

### Minneapolis Light-weight Assumes Limelight As Challenger For Canzoneri's Crown.

ST. PAUL, Feb. 3.—(AP)—A saw-edged, barrel-chested young man from Minneapolis, named Henry Tuttle, fighting under the name of King Tut, finds himself in a spot today to cause Tony Canzoneri, lightweight champion of the world, a lot of worry.

Tut jumped into the commanding position as a ranking challenger for the lightweight championship last night by scoring a startling upset victory over the battle-scarred Billy Petrolle in a craggy 24 seconds. He knocked out the famed "Fargo Express" before he could get out of his own corner and to the amazement of a record-smashing capacity crowd of 10,249 spectators who paid \$38,546 to witness the battle.

Surprise Punch  
As the bell changed starting the fight, Tut charged out of his corner, rushed across the ring and caught Petrolle before he could advance a step. Swinging a right-hand punch that started from his hips, he caught the bewildered Petrolle on the rim of the chin.

That blow dazed him and he desperately attempted to clinch. But the bull-like Tut instantly wrestled him off and then cracked him on the jaw with a barrage of rights and lefts. Petrolle's legs bent under him and he sank to the canvas, landing on his haunches, with his head hanging over the second rope of the ring.

While sitting in this position, unconscious to the excitement, Petrolle was counted out.

# SARPOLIS DRAWS WITH MALCEWICZ

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 3.—(AP)—Dr. Karl Sarpolis, Cleveland heavy, and Joe Malcewicz, Utica Panther, drew here last night in the main wrestling event, each taking a fall.

Sarpolis scored his fall in the third round by surprising the Panther with a flying scissors. Malcewicz evened it up in the seventh when he knocked out the doctor with a backward slam. The Cleveland just managed to answer the bell for the final round.
