New Trousered Skirts For Daytime Spring Wear Seen At Paris Clothing Display

By Adelaide Kerr, PARIS, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Trousered skirts for daytime wear were introduced by Paris couturiers today as a spring style innovation. The designs were so full that the bifurcated cut was revealed only when the wearer walked.

Among the models were blue linen suits for street wear and black satin ensembles for formal afternoon functions, both designed with full trousered skirts and hip length jackets. Virtually all the trousered models were made with a wide panel in the middle of the back falling the length of the skirt and concealing the bifurcated cut. The new skirts are 10 inches above the ground.

The couturiers varied the trousered evening designs by placing pajamas under chiffon or satin skirts. There were black satin evening frocks with skirts slashed to the knee on each side, revealing white satin pajamas underneath and white chiffon dinner suits the full skirts of which fell over silver lame pajamas.

Both daytime and evening fashions were displayed with interesting new gadgets. Quilted slimming lame coats of knee length, with kimono sleeves, were introduced and satin and beaded chiffon were exhibited as wraps for the more informal evening parties.

SENATE CONFIRMS TWO TO POWER COMMISSION

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—(AP)—The senate today confirmed two and rejected one of the nominations to the power commission over which it has engaged in a dispute with President Hoover. First, the senate rejected Chairman Smith by 40 to 33. Then it confirmed Commissioners Garsand, 39 to 35, and Draper, 39 to 36.

CHILD WELFARE GROUPS BATTLE DURING HEARING

Welfare Commission Flayed By Portland Woman As Attempting Set Up Political Machine.

SALEM, Feb. 1.—(AP)—Hostilities broke out between the state child welfare commission and the Oregon child caring federation when representatives of the two organizations appeared before the Ways and means committee last night. The latter charged the commission with interfering with the operation of the state-aided child caring institutions in and about Portland.

After Estes Snedecor, Mrs. Harry L. Corbett and Dr. J. W. Bonnell, all of Portland, had presented the commission's case, asking for a \$25,545 appropriation, Mrs. Alexander Thompson, of Portland, ex-member of the legislature, took the floor and scored the commission. She said it could operate easily on half the appropriation asked, and that "it is just a matter of curbing an effort to make a great big political machine out of the child welfare commission."

Mrs. Thompson assailed the commission for employing an executive secretary from outside the state at a salary of \$216.66 a month, while her predecessor had received only \$200 a month.

Rosecoe P. Hurst, Portland attorney and member of the legislature of all the state-aided institutions pointing to a woman in the audience, said: "There is a lady from one of the institutions who has the actual care of the babies, and she is paid \$100 a month. At the same time the executive secretary of the commission sits in an office in the Oregon building at \$216.66 a month and tells her how to care for babies."
