

District Cage Championship Rules Adopted by Committee

RURAL WINNERS OF 2 COUNTIES MUST PLAYOFF

Victor Will Challenge Leading Team of First Class Schools for Southern Area Crown.

A plan for deciding the district championship in basketball has been announced by the district committee consisting of H. L. Buhlman, of Grants Pass; Principal E. E. Evans of Chiloquin, and H. P. Jewett, chairman, of Central Point. Briefly the plan provides for the selection of the champion team among the smaller schools of Klamath and Jackson county, this winner to play the first-class team that wins.

A further provision is that this game must be played the week preceding the state tournament, and is to be played only on challenge from the smaller school. Without challenge the larger school automatically becomes district champion.

Another important regulation provides for the playing of so-called non-conference games, that is games between the small schools and the large schools played during the regular season prior to the championship game. These non-conference games are not to be counted in any way against the teams participating.

Under this ruling Medford's game with Chiloquin will be a non-conference game and will not affect the standing of either team. These plans for deciding the championship were informally approved by the coaches of the first-class schools in a recent meeting.

Details of the plan for an "A-conference" consisting of Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Grants Pass, and a "B-conference" consisting of all high schools in second and third class districts.

Owing to the large number of schools in the latter conference it was divided into the Jackson county division and the Klamath county division.

Winners of these two divisions are to play off at least two weeks preceding the state tournament. Present indications are that Phoenix will represent Jackson county and Chiloquin will play for Klamath county. Other strong contenders in the B-conference in Jackson county are Sams Valley and the St. Mary's team.

Great blue herons and other fish-eating birds, like most other birds, feed on what is common and easy to get, says the Biological Survey of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Their choice of food is so largely governed by availability that in most waters they will get only a small proportion of game or commercial fishes, as it is in small proportions that these fishes occur. The more valuable fishes not only are few in numbers in relation to the noncommercial species, but usually inhabit deeper water, are swifter, and hence are harder to catch than many of the so-called coarse fishes. In some trout streams there may be a preponderance of trout over other fishes, but in such streams the birds often find and capture water insects, crustaceans, frogs, snakes, and other creatures more easily than they do the elusive trout.

Wondering what becomes of the immense numbers of trout fry that are planted in streams, anglers naturally attribute their disappearance to the enemies that are most obvious, and they are particularly likely to blame the larger fish-eating birds, such as the herons. Studies of trout streams by the Biological Board of Canada, however, show that the greatest losses in trout fry are caused by enemy and competitor fishes. Few realize what serious destroyers of spawn there are among fishes themselves, such as stickleback, sculpin, suckers and minnows.

After hatching, the little fishes are decimated by cannibalistic attacks, of which none are worse than those of the trout and other game fishes themselves. Besides the fish enemies of fishes, the streams teem with insect and other enemies, such as the larvae of the predacious diving beetles or "water tigers," nymphs of dragon flies, giant water bugs, and crawfishes. All such fish enemies in turn are preyed upon by birds, and it is probable, except at fish hatcheries, that in most cases fish-eating birds more than make up for the harm they do in eating valuable fishes by their destruction of natural enemies of the whole fish tribe.

Further evidence that the sale of hunting and fishing licenses has been brisk so far this year, Al Piche reported today that he has sold 41 resident anglers licenses and 35 combination licenses. He also reported the sale of 17 resident hunters' licenses. Reports of good steelhead fishing in the Illinois river encouraged the sale, as well as fair fishing in the Rogue.

While fishing may have its attractions, hunting for wild game is more attractive to Vance Holcomb, recently of Seattle, he said the other day in comparing the two sports. He recalled his biggest

hunting thrill the other day and told of a spot in the Cascade mountains he believes had never before been visited by man. He said the game was so tame that he did not have the heart to shoot and was content to sit on a rock and watch them feed.
