DR. COLEMAN IN FIGHT AGAINST TRAFFIC EVILS

Whenever Dr. H. P. Coleman thinks about auto traffic evils in Medford, as he observes them, he becomes filled with mental aches and pains, and feeling exceptionally miserable in this regard. He sat down last Tuesday and penned to the city council the following chronicle in part of local traffic wrongs that rack his torso, which after being read at the council meeting that night were with brief but profound deliberation referred to the council streets and road committee for Joe Gray, its chairman, and other members to wrestle with.

"Why not make a stop street of Sixth street before any more lamp posts are knocked down or any more wrecks occur owing to the fact that every one coming into this street from side streets seems to think that they have the right of way?"

"I for one, and I know of many others, avoid traveling on Sixth street as much as possible, due to the danger of wrecks."

"Another thing, there has been a great deal said about eliminating the evils of one light motor cars, but in traveling about the city the other night I counted 21 cars passed with very defective lights, most with only one light."

"Why not have a traffic officer pick some of these flaming youth who, in an old tin Ford with muffler wide open, seem determined to beat the Englishman's record in Florida of 240 per?"

CENTRAL PT. BOYS FACING BURGLARY CHARGES IN JAIL

Accused of burglary, two Central Point boys, John O'Connor and Henry Slover, were arrested by the sheriff's office last night and are being held in the county jail for investigation. William A. Abrams was arrested with O'Connor on a still possession charge, when officers came to Abrams' place up on Yankee creek, near Trail, last evening to take O'Connor in custody.

Abrams is alleged to have been operating a kerosene still, perhaps capable of turning out a gallon a day. The two boys are implicated in a number of recent burglaries around Central Point, involving alleged thefts of kerosene and gasoline.

A small boy, seven years old, said to be Abrams' son, was brought down by the officers from Yankee creek and is under the care of county authorities. He is said to have been dressed only in rags.

James Kingsley, now on trial in circuit court for first degree murder, heard of the small boy's plight and made possible the purchase of new clothes for the little fellow. He said the case reminded him of his own early life.

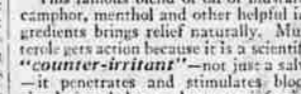

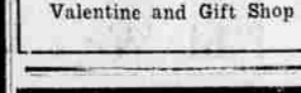
