ARCHITECT FOR COURTHOUSE TO BE DETERMINED

County Court Expects to Name Man By February 15—Contract and Material Are Next Steps.

The county court yesterday conferred with two architects on the proposed new \$250,000 Jackson county court house.

The first step in the courthouse project will be the selection of an architect and the court, at the present time has no idea who it

will be. A decision is expected to be reached by February 15, but it may take a few days longer. Next steps will be awarding of the contract and choice of material to be used.

The county court is also kept busy these days, urging the Jackson county delegation in the legislature to lay a heavy foot and hand on measures tending to increase taxation.

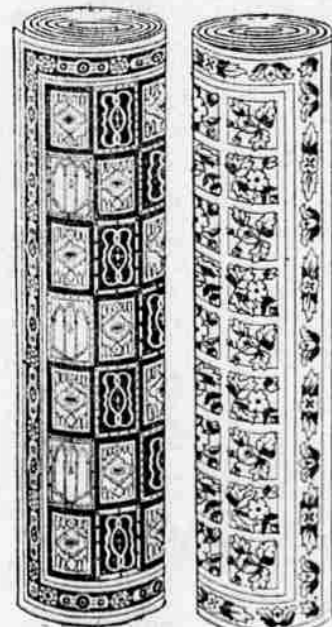
