PORTLAND, Feb. 6. — Spotted inquiry for butter in the wholesale market today centered particularly on 32 to 34 score cubes. Prices were steady with supply limited. Large shipments were under way to outside markets.

Butter market continued easy at unchanged quotations. Receipts were liberal, demand fair and some sales were forced at price concessions.

Tillamook County Creamery association quoted Tillamook cheese at a 10 advance today "due to advance in butter markets and small stocks." Quote: Tillamook triplets, 18c pound; loaf, 19c; 4 c. b. Tillamook.

In the fresh fruit and vegetable market, California repacked tomatoes were priced 22 cents lower at \$5.25 a big for the best. Hubbard was quoted from 75c to \$1.25 a box, around the lower.

Country dressed meat and poultry prices were unchanged.

Milk (butterfat), poultry, country meats, onions, potatoes, wool, nuts, hay, escrow bark and hops steady and unchanged.
