**PARALYTIC STROKE PROVES FATAL TO JOHN L. DEMMER**

John L. Demmer, one of the most widely known citizens of Jackson county who has been a resident of Medford for 28 years and known throughout the state for his ardent interest in fraternal work, died in the Community hospital at 11:00 o'clock today.

Mr. Demmer suffered a paralytic stroke on January 17, from which he failed to recover. He was born in Austria-Hungary, Dec. 3, 1867, aged 63 years. He came to this country with his parents when six years of age. During his residence in Medford, he has served efficiently in various capacities and was one time a member of the city council. He was a member of the Medford Masonic lodge and chapter and the Odd Fellows, Encampment and Rebekahs.

Besides his wife, Lily S. Demmer, he leaves four children, two of which, John M. Demmer of San Francisco and Edna Flower of Taft, Cal., are by a former marriage and Edward L. and Juanita Demmer of Medford. Also two step children and two sisters, Theresa Bruckner of Los Angeles and Minna Becker, Melrose, Oregon.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Conger chapel at 2:30 Sunday with Professor A. J. Hanby officiating. Services at the grave will be under auspices of the local Masonic lodge.
