BILLIE HAMMETT NAMED QUEEN OF JUNIOR CARNIVAL

Midst a blare of trumpets Miss Billie Hammett of the Junior class will be crowned queen of the fourth annual junior carnival this evening at 8 o'clock. The carnival is being conducted in the senior high school gymnasium. Miss Hammett was announced winner in the carnival edition of the 11 Times, school publication, circulated at the high school this afternoon. The winning candidate had a total of 337,600 votes. Miss Harriett Campbell, senior candidate, was second with 371,600; Miss Theda Moore, freshman, had 162,600 and Miss Vivian Meader, sophomore, 115,200.

A total of 1,049,900 votes was sold during the past two weeks in comparison with 857,800 sold previous to the carnival last year. Numerous committees were busy this forenoon completing booths and arrangements for the carnival. Every organization in the school will conduct some type of booth or show.

Miss Maurine Carroll, chairman, assisted by Miss Harriett Baldwin and Miss Mary Gilbert, is the committee of faculty members responsible for the successful arrangements. Miss Hammett, the queen, will be accompanied to the throne by the three class candidates, and ten members of the high school band will act as guards. Natalie and Barbara Shelby and Dale and Gale Beebe will lead the procession.

Wilton Colbaugh, vice-president of the junior class will crown the queen. Miss Adra Edwards, class president will give a short address of welcome.

A parade was conducted down Main and Sixth streets this afternoon advertising the carnival, with floats representing school organizations.

The gymnasium will be open at 7 o'clock, as will the various concessions. Following the coronation, dancing will be enjoyed. Music will be furnished by Frank Graham and his Six Crackers.
