Coming to the defense of persons who hunt deer with shot-guns, a number of local sportsmen today declared they could see nothing wrong with the use of such firearms, as it is claimed to be harder to kill bucks that way than with rifles.

One hunter told how he found the carcass of a buck by a water course with its lower jaw shot away. It had been wounded by a rifle bullet, inflicting such injuries that the animal was unable to eat or drink, resulting in a slow death by starvation and thirst.

Some hunters cut the shotgun shot at the point where the wadding separates the powder from the pellets. The paper is cut so deeply that the shell is barely able to hold together, Al Piche explained, and the charge leaves the gun almost as a bullet and travels at high velocity for 50 yards.

New Manager Signed. Portland will present a new manager in Spencer Abbott, late of Omaha, this season, which makes it somewhat tough on Woodall, as the latter held down that berth last year.

Pitcher Wanted. Among the holdovers are Walter Mathis, only left hander on the squad; Ray Keating, spitball veteran; Curtis Fullerton and John "Junk" Walker, the handy man of the club, who when not pitching, does such chores as cleaning the bats, mending the equipment, and playing all positions in the outfield and infield.

The younger fingers include Bill Paschel, farmed out last year; Herbert Lahti, who joined the team late last season and is the property of the Athletics for 1932 delivery; Joe Bowman, farmed out to Omaha last year; Wilbur Martin, "Labe" Alexander, an Ontario, Ore., youth and Bart Smith, ex-University of Arizona player.

Jack Fenton, first baseman acquired from Oakland in a trade for Fred Ortman, southpaw pitcher, is the only newcomer to the infield. Bill Rhell will handle second base. He is arguing for more money at present, but is expected to come to terms.

Veterans will hold down the outfield, with Ken Williams, Walter French and Charley Bates as holdovers. Howard Summa, called by the Athletics last season, is now Portland property. He is the best man they have had in right field since the days of Billy Spaul.
