

UPWARD TREND FOR STOCK WHEAT AND CORN PRICES

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.—(AP)—After three vain efforts, the stock market finally broke through the January highs today and established the best prices of the year, as measured by the average of 30 leading issues.

Something like an old-fashioned rally swept through the list in the last half-hour when the turnover amounted to 600,000 shares. Group movements were rather well defined, especially in the motor, chemical and office equipment stocks, which labelled the advance as professional.

COMPROMISE ON MORE LOANS FOR VETERANS LOOMS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 7.—(AP)—A difference of opinion on veterans' relief prospects developed today among republican leaders in the house and senate while rank and file of both parties believed a compromise for additional loans was secure.

Under secretary Ogden Mills of the treasury and republican leader Tilson conferred behind closed doors, immediately thereafter Tilson said any pronouncement must come from the ways and means committee—and chairman Hawley declined to talk.

Other republican house leaders, however, favored the \$500,000,000 proposal which Representative Bacharach, republican, New Jersey, yesterday informed the treasury would meet general approval.

The White House issued a denial that Bacharach discussed a compromise there last night—and some newspapers had said—and word was given that the treasury had not endorsed the substitute plan.

The senate finance committee deferred action on bills for cash redemption of service certificates to await the outcome of a showdown in the house group next Wednesday.

Senator Watson of Indiana, republican leader, expressed belief that "some form" of veterans' relief legislation would go through the house—but shortly thereafter Reed of Pennsylvania, another republican spokesman, held consultations in the house and spoke skeptically.

"We have been reckless with veterans' legislation," Reed said. "I think that \$300,000,000 would be plenty to spend for this legislation at this time. I am not sure that that will go through."

Intelligence, planting crops that supply nitrogen, ploughing under, instead of harrowing, adds humus material. In France wheat has been cultivated on the same land for two hundred years, and the land produces more now than ever.

The big, modern, surplus production, can be solved only by increase in population. If we had fifty million more population in the United States there would be no surplus food problem, no good second hand automobiles unsold, no prosperity problem either.

France, smaller than one of our states, with forty million population, is the most prosperous country in the world. But our people, in congress, on farms and in labor unions, are afraid to admit the human beings that this country needs.
