SALEM, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Marjorie Lois, 3½ year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Krebs, living in Polk county near here, wandered too close to a brush fire Sunday afternoon and her clothing caught fire. She died in a Salem hospital six hours later.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 9.—(AP)—Three men, ranging in age from 63 to 80 years, were dead today, each the victim of a fire. L. J. Root, 70, died when he tried to extinguish a fire that started in his living quarters in The Dalles. Andrew J. Smith, 89, lost his life in a fire which destroyed his small home at Corvallis. His body was found under an overturned stove. Howard E. Andrews, 63, was killed when a burning snag fell on him near his Vancouver, Wash., home.

# COMMITTEE FAVORS VET HOSPITAL BILL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—(AP)—The house veterans hospital subcommittee today approved the Rogers bill to authorize \$12,000,000 for hospital construction. The full committee is expected to approve the measure tomorrow. Veterans Administrator Hines recommended a \$10,000,000 program for enactment this session, supplying 2797 additional beds and providing for the construction of four new hospitals.

# NEW TREMORS BRING TERROR ZEALAND EARL

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Feb. 9.—(AP)—Residents of the devastated Hawkes Bay district were terrified and driven from their temporary shelters by a new series of violent tremors today.

The quakes felled many buildings not wholly destroyed in last week's tremors and toppled piles of masonry, battered the benches, forcing the panic stricken inhabitants to higher ground.

Napier, Hastings and the Waipara district especially felt the shocks. The face of a bluff overlooking Napier was sheared off by a landslide. There were no casualties. Residents are living in tents and other temporary shelters. On the outskirts of Hastings this morning relief workers found two young girls half mad from their experiences in the earthquake.

# EXPLORERS ASHES TO LIE IN CHASM

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 9.—(AP)—The ashes of Claude E. Rusk, author and explorer, will find their last resting place in a deep crevasse in the Mount Adams glacier that was named for him. Rusk died at the age of 59 at Grants Pass, Ore., February 3. The Cascadians of Yakima, Wash., are to perform the final service.

As a boy, Rusk looked from his log cabin home in eastern Klickitat county, Wash., to snow-clad Adams, sixty miles away. He dreamed that some day he would climb that mountain. The dream came true July 6, 1889.

# SMASHED HEADLIGHT BETRAYS HIT RUNNER

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 9.—(AP)—The rim from a shattered headlight and part of a broken motor-motor yesterday caused the arrest of Ivan F. Saygen, 38, on a manslaughter charge. The two objects were picked up Saturday night when Emerie Drier, 14, was found unconscious in the street, the apparent victim of a hit-and-run driver. Drier died at a hospital without regaining consciousness.

Destruction of the North Dakota statehouse by fire has led to a move to make the Texas capitol fireproof.

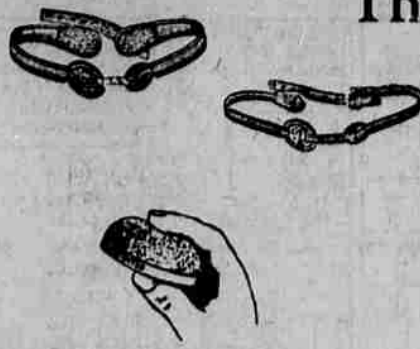

Beam Guides Planes LOS ANGELES—Additional insurance of the reliability of planes of Transcontinental & Western Air, operating between here and New York, will occur soon when the radio direction beam, which notifies pilots when they are on or off their course, will be in operation here. A two-million-candlepower light now guides pilots as they cross the San Gabriel Mountains close to Los Angeles.

Kills Wolf From Air MILES CITY—Successful wolf hunting from the air is reported by Frank Wiley, local aviator. Knowing that wolves are killing off many sheep, Wiley spotted one while in flight, swooped down and shot it to death.

Planes Are Equipped NEW YORK—One of the largest fleets of mail, express and passenger planes in the country, totaling 24, are now equipped with two-way voice radio apparatus, and have contact with 20 stations stretching across the nation, according to officials of Transcontinental & Western Air.

Forecasts Expansion DENVER—Additional expansion of service on the part of air transport companies in Colorado during 1931 is predicted by Capt. Charles W. France, general superintendent of Midcontinent Air Express. He bases his belief on the steady increase in air travel during last year.

Stockmen Fly DENVER—Many Stockmen who exhibited at the National Western Stock show and Rodeo here arrived by air transport lines, arriving ahead of their cattle in order to complete arrangements.

Will Go After Records LOS ANGELES—The Rumanian government plans to go after some of the distance records now held by French aviators, it was declared here by Prince Ionel Matei Ghika of that country, who came here to purchase a locally built airplane for the first flight, from Bucharest to South Africa.

Preparations for the entertainment of 75,000,000 visitors are being made by the management of the Chicago 1933 world's fair.

College Flying School STILLWATER, Okla.—Aviation training at the Oklahoma A. and M. college here progresses with the securing of the municipal airport lease for a flying school by the Garland School of Aeronautics of Tulsa. The move carries with it plans for a downtown ground school in aeronautics here in conjunction with the college.
