Special Recipes

Choy Suey

2 cups cold chicken
1 cup cooked celery
1 onion
1/4 cup fat
1 tablespoon cornstarch
2 cups chicken stock
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
Boiled rice

Cut chicken, celery and onion in strips. Fry onion in fat until a delicate brown. Add cornstarch mixed to a smooth paste with a little cold water. Add chicken, celery and stock and stir until mixture thickens. Season with salt and pepper and Worcestershire. Serve on a mound of hot boiled rice.

To make Chinese chop suey, add 1 cup sautéed mushrooms, 1 can bean sprouts, drained, and 1 can bamboo shoots to the chicken mixture. If possible, serve in green Chinese dishes.—McCall's Magazine for January.

Rabbit Tomato

1/2 lb. yellow cheese
1 1/2 cups tomato soup
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon Worcestershire
2 eggs

Cut yellow cheese into small pieces or, if soft enough, press through a strainer, and combine with tomato soup. Place over hot water and stir frequently until cheese is melted. Add butter, salt, pepper and Worcestershire. Beat eggs slightly and add to cheese mixture, stirring constantly. Cook slowly, over water, until thickened. Serve on crisp crackers.—By Dorothy Kirk in McCall's for January.

Fried Chicken, Maryland

Select young chickens weighing 2 1/2 to 3 pounds. Clean, singe and disjoint. Sprinkle each piece with salt and pepper and roll in flour. Dip in beaten egg mixed with a little cold water and then in fine bread crumbs. Melt enough fat in the frying pan to half cover chicken. Cover pan and fry on both sides until a delicate brown. This will require 25 to 30 minutes. Remove chicken to platter and keep hot. Pour off all but 2 tablespoons of the fat. Add 3 tablespoons flour and stir until smooth. Add 2 cups milk and salt and pepper to taste. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Pour around chicken and serve with pieces of broiled ham and corn fritters.
