DRINKS SERVED BY NEGRESSES IN GAUDY TOGS

Prohi Raid On Seattle Chinese 'Club' Reveals Flourishing Bar Room—Kids Present.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Federal agents smashed their way through three heavily barred doors of the Hong Kong Chinese society's club rooms here last night and found what they described as a flourishing bar room. Fifty customers, many of them fashionably gowned women were present. Gaudily costumed negroes acted as hostesses and bartenders and on tables were partly filled glasses and bottles of liquor and beer, the officers said. Several arrests were made. The establishment known as "the Bucket of Blood," because of its custom of serving beer in tin buckets or "growlers" agents said, is located in a section of the city commonly referred to as "below the Line." A white woman posted behind a little vestibule guarded by one of the heavy doors, was arrested as a lookout. Officials also said eight youths of school age were taken to police headquarters.

Parole Three on Burglary Charge

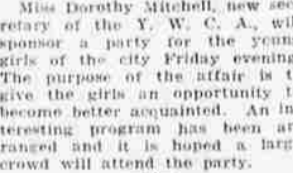

FRATS ORDERED PADLOCK DOORS ACCOUNT BOOZE

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Feb. 12.—(AP)—Five fraternities involved in Wednesday morning's liquor raids have been ordered by the university committee on student affairs to lock their doors until September 1, 1931. The order is effective immediately and the committee further stated that after September 1 the houses may be opened. The order stated that although they were reopened in September they would be under the restriction of social probation for the ensuing school year. National officers of the fraternities were warned that a recurrence would mean cancellations of their charters in Ann Arbor. The five fraternities involved were Theta Delta Chi, Phi Delta Theta, Delta Kappa Epsilon, Kappa Sigma and Sigma Alpha Epsilon.

WASHINGTON AUTO FEE BILL ADOPTED

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 12.—(AP)—With only two dissenting votes, the Washington state senate today passed a bill providing for a 35 cent license fee for passenger automobiles and an increase of two cents in the gasoline tax. Disagreement with the proposal by the house loomed, however, with the roads and bridges committee today reporting favorably the "eight and one" bill, by Representative William S. Westover, Grays Harbor, providing an 85 cent license fee and a one-cent increase in the gas tax.
