

MEIER PLAN FOR POLICE IS OPPOSED

Motor Association, Game Commission, W. C. T. U. and Secretary of State Voice Disapproval of Constabulary for Oregon.

SALEM, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Opposition to various phases of the state police bill, chief among which was the inclusion of the traffic department into the constabulary system, was voiced at the hearing before the senate revision of law committee last night. The measure as introduced by Senator B. L. Eddy was drafted by Attorney L. A. Ljovind and George Tomerth, and carries with it the endorsement of Governor Julius L. Meier.

Secretary of State Hal E. Hoag appeared before the committee protesting, as he had done by letter to the governor previously, the plan to transfer the traffic law enforcement from his department to the police system, and filed a long brief with the committee setting forth his objections.

Others appearing included Representatives of the Oregon State Motor Association, State Labor organization, Portland Harbor Council, the W. C. T. U. and members of the game and fish commissions.

Two individuals, representing taxpayers urged adoption of the measure, while Sam Kozar, former secretary of state, suggested co-operation plans and reviewed the history of the highway patrol in Oregon.

Senator Eddy, in recommending the bill, declared the system provided for officers to represent the "majority of the state of Oregon," rather than each branch performing only its own duties. He declared the plan would eliminate duplication and would probably result in a saving to the state of a quarter million dollars.

Act Head Impractical
Robert Parfitt of the fish commission protested the inclusion of some of the duties of the fish and game wardens, while E. F. Averill declared the act impractical. The elimination of the prohibition commissioner and placing his duties in the state police program, was protested by Mrs. W. K. Coffey, representing the W. C. T. U. Newell Williams, who declared he only represented the increasing Williams family, and speaking as a taxpayer, urged adoption of the bill.

Motivists of the state protest the changing of the traffic department, brings its status back to where it was years ago, declared Ray Conway, representing the motorists. The matter of highway patrol is also one of education and for the safety of motorists, and not one with the sole aim of arresting criminals. He stated, with prohibition and police powers, the publicity attached would keep tourists, who resent having their cars searched, out of the state.

Ben T. Osborne, executive secretary of Oregon Labor Federation, said the move was opposed by labor, mostly on general principles, and that if adopted the state would be "drifting back to militarism."

Hoss, in his statements, declared states where the constabulary system was used, and whose plans were used as patterns of the present bill kept the traffic department separate. He pointed to the efficiency of the present traffic system. He further stated that the enforcement of traffic laws was closely allied with the automobile registration department, and they should be kept together.

Three other hearings were held during the evening, one on the new game code, another on child welfare legislation and one on the basic science bill, all before respective committees. The "use of stool-pigeons" was one of the objections made to the game code, as well as denying the farmer a right to carry a gun on his own property.

LOAN FUNDS FOR FOOD IF NECESSARY

Hoover Approves Use of \$20,000,000 Drought Compromise for Food and Clothing By Farmers—Hyde Gives Opinion.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—The administration today sanctioned the use of the \$20,000,000 drought loan fund compromise for food and clothing purchases.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Secretary Hyde today informed the senate there is no prohibition in the drought relief compromise against using the loans for the purchase of food and clothing by farmers.

Robinson Replies.
A while before Vice-President Curtis had the Hyde message read, Democratic Leader Robinson had declared congress could be charged with inefficiency if it failed to pass the remedial measure. He was replying to attacks on the compromise from within his own party ranks.

An attentive senate heard the agriculture secretary's interpretation, a quorum call having brought many absentees to the floor.

The Hyde statement began with an assertion that the proposed funds were not intended for the purchase of food and clothing. However, the conclusion said there was no prohibition against the borrowers using the funds for that purpose, if necessary.

The secretary upheld the contention of Senators Robinson and Caraway, Democrats, of Arkansas who have accepted the compromise.

Senator Borah, Republican, of Idaho, and other Republican independents and some Democrats are fighting the compromise on the \$25,000,000 Red Cross appropriation which was voted by the senate, only to meet stiff opposition in this house.

The \$20,000,000 fund dealt with by Hyde today is a substitute for that appropriation.

Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, at the conclusion of the reading said "it sounds like the Wickersham report."

Senator Barkley, Democrat, of Kentucky, proposed sending it to the attorney general "to find out what it means."

Representatives Fisher, Glass, Gouley, Hamilton, Hellberg, McPhillips, Nash, Nichols, Oxman, Proctor, Mrs. Smith, Stewart, Thornburgh, Tompkins, and Weatherford. All members were present to vote.

Repeating attacks on the emergency board, Senators J. E. Stapher, C. H. Eberhard and E. W. Miller attributed most of the departmental and institutional financial shortages to members of the ways and means committee each session who have had no experience on that committee at previous sessions, and Senator Miller was particularly bitter in his denunciation of the ways and means committee, which he termed "an untidy alliance." The three voted against the bill.

enabling act for creation of a district to construct a tunnel. Creates Commission

The first measure would place the building of highway tunnels under the duties of the highway commission. This was withdrawn and the one just voted down would create a separate commission of three members, appointed by the governor, to construct and sell bonds for the project. The bill was designed for construction of the \$5,000,000 proposed project west of Portland.

An anti-trading stamp bill was introduced by Senator William F. Woodward of Multnomah county. The bill would make the issuing of "any stamps, coupons, certificates, cards, package labels or wrappers, can covers, bottle caps or other similar devices" which would entitle the person receiving them to any premiums or bonuses, a misdemeanor, subject to fine or imprisonment or both.

Objecting to the clause that financial aid would be withheld from state institutions and others obtaining any aid if such institution used any form of butterfat substitute, house members sent Senator Joe Dunne's oleomargarine bill back to the committee on food and dairy products to eliminate the particular section.

Three house bills up for final reading were re-referred to the ways and means committee because of revenue producing features. The bills provided that when relatives or the estates of feeble-minded school, state tuberculosis hospitals or the state training schools are financially able, they shall contribute to the upkeep of the inmate in question.

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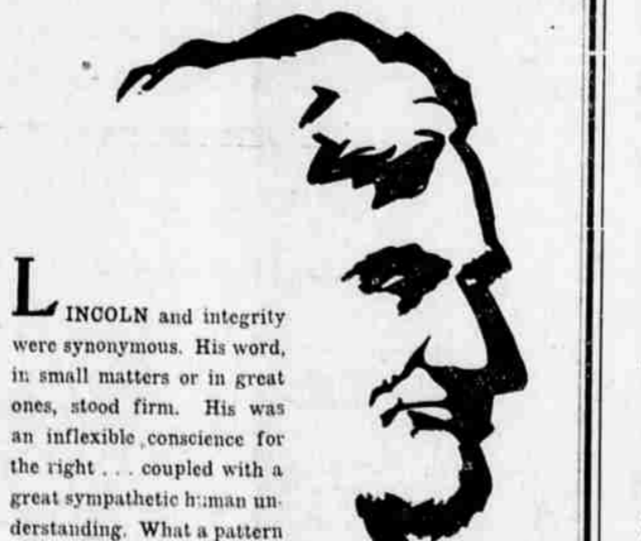
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
