GERMAN WAGES SACRIFICED ON ALTAR OF DEBT

BERLIN, Feb. 7. — (AP) — If sweeping wage and salary cuts can set Germany on her financial feet and put her in a position to meet her obligations under the Young plan, then creditor nations need not worry about setting their money.

There is no doubt that at least so much of the Brüning government's "Spartan economy" program is going into effect.

Finance reform laws decreed by President von Hindenburg and accepted by the Reichstag called for the slashing of civil service and official salaries all the way up the line, including a 20 per cent cut for the president himself.

And for weeks it has been impossible to pick up a Berlin paper without seeing nationwide evidence of the wage and salary-cutting program of private industry.

Example Is Set

Any doubt that the government meant what it said when it announced that the production costs of industry must come down was removed when the president intervened in the Ruhr wage conflict with an emergency decree empowering the minister of labor to declare a wage-cut arbitration award valid even if it suits neither workers nor employers, provided "the public interest demands it."

This action, involving a cut in the vitally important Ruhr mining industry, was everywhere accepted as notification that the government would stand for no procrastination in the matter of scaling production costs.

Wage disputes still pending in other parts of Germany therefore are looked upon as certain to end in some kind of cuts, even if they are not as big as the employers would like to have.

Lower Prices Promised

In justice to people whose wages or salaries are being slashed anywhere from 5 to 20 per cent, the Brüning government has let it be known that prices must come down, too.

To what extent this will affect the retail field remains to be seen. But one thing seems fairly certain. With general wage-cuts actually going into effect, German industry will be able to sell its goods more cheaply abroad.

And if it can sell enough goods abroad at greater profits made possible by lower wages here, then Germany will have more money available for reparations payments.

SPELLING SUFFERS WHEN PUPILS GRAPPLE THEMES

ATLANTA (AP)—Students' spelling in examinations, where the words are presented in column form, is less per cent better than their spelling in ordinary theme-writing.

This is the conclusion of Dr. Harold H. Bixler, director of tests in Atlanta schools.

Dr. Bixler also discovered that after a student masters 1000 words each additional 1,000 adds only one per cent to his writing vocabulary.

Business and the public have placed on spelling a value greater than its intrinsic worth, Dr. Bixler believes, as a misspelled word seldom changes the meaning of a letter.

BIOLOGISTS FIND MANY PROBLEMS IN STUDYING ANT

The ant presents an inexhaustible wealth of delight. Should one have longed to live in the midst of a primitive society, he may literally find one in the Ponderosa ants of the north-dwellers of the damp sunkened soil of our deep woods, and shimmers of light.

They live their lives entirely underground, save for the flying queens and males. They may be seen in midsummer cautiously warning their young under the coolest and dampest of stones. While the larvae lie neglected in the brood-chamber, the queens work, as do the workers, for the colonies may number but ten or a dozen individuals, all told. The members fight among themselves for the spoil scattered first discovered on the floor, as the first humans fought in the early days of man's existence.

The ant offers a wealth of sociological, ethnological and biological problems.

What is the marvelous instinct whereby a parasitic young queen may persuade the workers of the host species to assassinate their queen in her favor? At what own quest in her favor? At what own quest in her favor?

What is the true ant first split from the stock of its mysterious subterranean, wasp-like ancestor?

What is the biological secret of the caste, and of their subsequent discarding in the highest ants, until only queen, male and single worker form are left? What is the chemical metabolism of the wingless members of the isolated queen, whose fat is made available to nourish herself and her first brood? What is the secret of the curious mixed-caste forms which sometimes appear in the nests—half queen, half male, or half male, half worker? What is the nature of the ant conversation, which, fixed and elemental though it be, is constantly occurring—half a language of symbol, half of sound? These and a score of other fascinating questions present themselves in the commonest ant.
