The size of the great organization is measured not only in its membership but by its outstanding achievements in fields of education, public welfare, child and community health, legislation for the protection of women and children and a wider understanding by parents and educators of the needs of children of all ages.

Many who helped Mrs. Birney realize her dream are still giving a faithful and loving service which has continued through thirty-four years. May we do them honor and strive to carry on when only time shall compel them to give up their joyful labor of love.

The White House conference in 1929 was made possible by that first conference thirty-four years ago and we hope to measure the future in terms of the progress of the past.

Meanwhile millions of mothers continue raising families on less than \$25 a week and are praised by nobody, not even by their husbands.

## Final Notice to Milk Producers and Distributors

A milk grading period is now at hand. Ordinance No. 2541 of the City of Medford provides that no milk shall be graded for any producer until the permit is secured. No milk or table cream can be sold within Medford unless the distributor has a permit and the product is graded by the Health Officer.

Milk distributors are required to have a permit each year, to sell or handle milk. Renewals for 1931 must be secured at once.
