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JUDGE SPARROW TALKS FINANCES BEFORE KIWANIS

While the financial condition of Jackson county may not be as good as it had been in past years, there are still 20 other counties in the state with more tax delinquencies resulting in a shortage of funds, County Judge Alex Sparrow told members of the Kiwanis club in weekly luncheon session at the Hotel Medford today.

The present situation is especially due to no provision having been made for a reserve fund. In the past whatever surplus had remained from one year to the next was returned to the general fund and the taxes were reduced accordingly instead of permitting the amount to ride over into the next year to be available in the case of so-called depression.

Due to shortage of money in certain funds, some warrants have been protested and will not be paid until money is available. Until that time, the county pays interest of 6 per cent on such warrants. The payments will be reflected in the budget for next year.

The present outstanding indebtedness, said Judge Sparrow, is \$291,000 and has been greatly reduced during the past few years. Necessity has demanded the curbing of wages in connection with county workers engaged by the road department and would have been extended to other workers had the county court had the power to make such cuts possible.

At the present, the cut has affected only 30 men but next summer when there are greater activities, the cut will affect more. The laborers are receiving \$3.20 per day or 26 cents more per day than the wages paid men who have acquired employment under the emergency employment relief measure. The judge pointed out that a person today can buy more for four dollars than was possible with five dollars a year ago. The cut has also made possible the employment of more men.

Judge Sparrow aimed a few remarks against the proposed old age pension measure, under consideration by the state legislature. This would provide the sum of \$20 per month for every person reaching the age of 65, providing they had property or worth of less than \$2000. He said this would add a burden which the taxpayers would find impossible to pay. At the present, the county is providing for its indigents at an average of \$15 each per month. The judge is also against the proposed legislation which would mean that any transient would be regarded as a permanent resident of any county if he had lived there for a period of six months. The present law sets the time limit of one year in the county and three years in the state.

He discussed the payment of taxes by indigents and the hardship imposed upon them by taxation. Whenever possible, the county has done its utmost to preserve the indigent's ownership of home.

Next Monday's Kiwanis session promises to be another interesting meeting, Bishop Sumner of Portland being scheduled to give the main address. A 100 per cent attendance is expected.

FRESH SNOW FOR PARK DURING RAIN SPELL IN VALLEY

While rain fell in the valley the past two days, six inches of fresh snow fell at Crater national park, making the snow depth there 55 inches at government camp, 50 inches at Anna Spring camp, between 45 and 70 inches at the rim, and corresponding depths at the Medford and Klamath entrances. In addition to the rainfall of the previous day, .93 of an inch fell in Medford yesterday. Today was cloudy and foggy for the most part and stormy weather is reported as prevailing at Crater National park.

The above mentioned snowfall and rain in the past few days, together with the forecast of further rain for tonight and Tuesday brightens up the valley irrigation outlook for the coming summer as during the week or 10 days warm spell preceding, the prior snow at the national park became packed down solidly and the fresh fall of six inches will form another layer of congealed soil to be packed down into ice by further snow and rain.

The minimum temperature of today, 27 degrees, fell disagreeably cold in comparison with the warm weather that had been prevailing, especially because of the heavy morning fog, which was so dense in Medford as to cause the air mail planes to land at Barron field, about nine miles south of Ashland.

The total rainfall up to this morning, since September 1, amounted to 6.50 inches.

SCHOOL CONTRACT WILL BE AWARDED AT MEET TONIGHT

The Medford school board will meet this evening to let contracts for the construction of the Washington school, including the general contract, wiring, plumbing and heating contracts.

The general contract does not include painting, mill work, blackboards, waterclosets, linoleum nor any equipment. Contracts for these things will be let separately by the board at a later date.

Contracts for the high school building will be let February 23. About 12 bids are expected on the general contract for the Washington school and from six to eight on each of the minor contracts, members of the board stated today.
