BOYS, FATHERS EUGENE YOUTHS HEAR LEADER IN CAPTURED HERE SCOUT MEETING FOR BAD CHECK

Trio Held in Jail for Arrival of Parents After Attempt to Secure Funds From Local Stores

A desire to see the world led three young Eugene boys to misfortune in Medford and a room in the county jail, where they are held for the arrival of parents from Eugene to take them in charge. The boys were apprehended after they had successfully passed a bad check on a local establishment. When they attempted to pass a second check at the Jennings lawn shop on Front street, Cecil Jennings, proprietor, became suspicious and notified the police.

Following a short search, the lads were brought to the police station, where they gave their names as Arthur Stewart, 14, Earl Tupper, 14, and Hollis Edwards, 13.

The Tupper boy told officers he was guilty of the check writing in an effort to obtain funds to continue their southward journey. They were not certain of their destination but had planned to go as far away from home as they could.

One Check Cashed
The Newberry store on Central avenue cashed a check for \$4.85 in payment for a fifty-cent purchase. The check was drawn on the First National Bank and was made payable to Earl White. It was signed by the signature of A. D. Cole in childish scrawl.

The three boys made brave attempts to tell false versions of their visit to Medford but finally confessed to their bad check operations. They said one check was passed in Eugene to provide money for bus fares to this city.

They declared they had not been mistreated at home but wanted to do something different. Tupper is believed to be the leader of the trio and was in tears most of the forenoon.
