

# Fast Grapplers Slated for Appearance at Armory Tonight

## JONES, LYNESS MEET IN MAIN EVENT ON CARD

Former World's Champion Here From Utah for Shot at Lyness—Elliott Meets Breese.

The future of wrestling bouts in Medford will depend much on the support the Henry Jones-Ray Lyness match at the armory will receive tonight. Herb Owen has gone to considerable expense to bring Jones to Medford from Utah and was forced to post a good guarantee for Lyness to bring him down from Seattle, where he is regarded as one of the big shots in the welterweight division.

Jones is the ex-world's junior champion in his division and last the title here several months ago in a match with Yaqui Joe, Sonora Indian, who held it only a short time before losing it to Wildcat Pete of Eugene. It has changed hands several times since it was won by Pete. It is now held by Waino Ketonen and if attendance is good tonight, it is possible a championship match may be held here in a short time. It is also probable some of the heavyweights, including Bob Kruse, John Proberg, Dr. Karl Sarpolis and Charles Hansen may be brought down at later dates.

**Jones Has Pet Hold**  
Tonight's card will show some of the fastest and most skillful wrestling seen in Medford this season, and Jones' famous whip wrist-lock will probably be brought into useful action. Jones has spent years perfecting the hold and if once securely obtained, it usually results in a fall for the holder. Lyness is up on all the late holds and is adept in guarding against the whip and may use a few himself.

Earl Breese, eastern Oregon matman, will make things interesting for Harry Elliott, Eugene, in the first event of the evening. Breese has a long list of victories to his credit in the eastern part of the state and believes Elliott will be another stepping stone in his ascent of the ladder of wrestling fame. Elliott is a former wrestling coach at the University of Oregon and has a general knowledge of holds which may prove Breese's undoing.

The card will begin promptly at 8:30. There are no reserved seats and the first come will be first served.

## BALTIMORE GAME OPEN FOR OREGON

The Ashland Gun club is also in the midst of a busy season and has been keeping traps busy on the airport two miles south of Ashland. There are quite a number of good shooters in the Granite City and it is possible an inter-city meet may be held before long.

Alarm is spreading throughout the country over the obvious shortage of the quail crop and the depletion of wildfowl—principally ducks, according to reports to the American Game Association. Hunters themselves are clamoring for remedial measures to save the capitol stock, and feature as nearly as possible the future of these species.

Mr. Buckingham also recommended that sufficient authority be given state game departments to make regulations to meet all such emergencies. Sportsmen in Tennessee desired to close the season on quail but the state game department was powerless to do so as such authority rests in the legislature only. While covens perished from eating arsenic-killed insects or poisoned dew. Nests of egg clutches were found containing baked remnants of forming bird life," Mr. Buckingham said in enumerating causes for the bird and wildfowl shortage.
