Four years ago he became connected with the newly established coast air mail line and was one of the local citizens most active in encouraging the construction of Medford's new airport north of the city, providing this section with one of the finest airports in the state.

CRATERIAN ORGAN WILL BE FEATURE

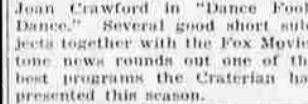

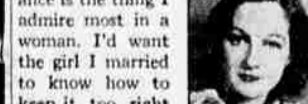
