LEGGEE SEES BETTER DAY FOR WHEAT

The rapid movement of wheat to market at the present time is the chairman attributed to two factors: That the cash price is now above July future quotations and that an open winter with roads unobstructed by snow has permitted hauling.

Dwindling of Stocks in Important Producing Countries Bullish Factor—Emphatic Warning Against Increased Acreage.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—(P)—The possibility that the grain stabilization corporation might hold as much as 200,000,000 bushels of wheat by July 1, was seen today by Chairman Legge of the farm board.

He said that should this possibility materialize the 200,000,000 bushels would comprise nearly all of the domestic carryover.

Holdings of cash wheat of the stabilization corporation, Legge estimated at approximately 100,000,000 bushels.

He gave no estimate of the holdings of the corporation represented in many futures.

Regarding March futures, however he said the corporation would take delivery. Asked if the March futures totalled 10,000,000 bushels, he said he doubted they were half that much.

Sees Tranquil Market
He expressed the belief that the calling of the March future contracts "would not disturb the market a particle."

Legge found several bullish factors in recent wheat market news, particularly in dwindling stocks in the important producing countries.

He reiterated, nevertheless, an emphatic warning that farmers

should not plant more wheat.
