government, takes all the money away from Mellon, Rockefeller, Baker and Ford, and gives free aid to everybody, "with wild children roaming around," in consequence it will not be the fault of Dr. Patmont. He has warned this government.

Meanwhile these Russians enemies of capitalism do a little capitalist business on their own account. An American firm the Ellington Schild Company has contracted to buy fifty million dollars worth of furs from Russia, ten million dollars worth every year for five years. And this government, recovering from its Russo-phobia, in a lucid interval approves the transaction. Also Russia's government spends more than ours and has a surplus instead of a deficit, and every man in Russia has a job, whether he wants it or not. No idle class allowed. Such a country should be able to feed its wild children.

It pays to care for your health. At the Biltmore hotel, here, you may see James J. Corbett, who long ago to the world's heavyweight championship from John L. Sullivan, voice as strong as when he fought his big fights. His weight is not ten pounds above what it was in training, and his chest measurement is at least ten inches greater than his waist measurement, as it should be.

"Eat little and at regular hours, plenty of fruit, never eat quite as much as you think you want, and never eat unless you are really hungry. Cut down on food when you cut down on work, as you would do for a horse. Take regular exercise, suited to your age, daily baths. Health is man's normal condition. He must do something foolish to lose it. A man would live long and die peacefully and painlessly, like a child going to sleep." Thus spoke James J. Corbett.

A group of Italian priests, begging the pope to "defend the souls of our parishioners satanically besieged and daily exposed to tremendous perils," called from the pope a protest against Mussolini's government of great historical importance. The pope said that through some high phenomenon of telepathy he had arrived at the same conclusion, and then formulated his grounds on serious complaint against the Mussolini government.

He formally accused the government of permitting and encouraging "the triple evil of immoral newspapers, motion pictures and vaudeville shows," and protested, with especial earnestness, against government countenancing Protestant propaganda, "to an extent that surprises even the Protestants."

The pope shows physical as well as mental courage in his criticisms of Mussolini's conduct and failure to live up to the Lateran treaty, as the pope understands it. Mussolini, who was an extreme radical before he rose to power, is not religious at heart and not fond of criticism. The pope's (by domination lies in the hollow of Mussolini's hand, and Europe must wonder what would happen if any check to Mussolini's power should threaten.

Postmaster General Brown, urging private air mail carriers to do better, with higher speed and lower charges, reveals the interesting fact that "the military branches of the government are not at all enthusiastic about any part that civil aeronautics might play in any preparedness program."

SOIL AND WATER WILL BE TALKED BEFORE GROWERS

Much interest is being shown by fruitgrowers of the valley in the meeting to be held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the Elks temple, reports L. P. Wilcox, county agent.

Orchard fertilizing as well as other soil management problems are to be discussed by Prof. C. V. Ruzek of the Oregon State Agricultural college. Prof. Ruzek has carried on many fertilizer experiments and is well qualified to report upon the question of orchard fertilizing.

The matter of moisture conservation will also be discussed. Olen Arnsperger, engineer for the Medford and Talent Irrigation districts, reports that he will be prepared to acquaint the grower with the true facts pertaining to the storage water situation. All growers should be present so that they may know the facts and thus govern their orchard operations accordingly.
