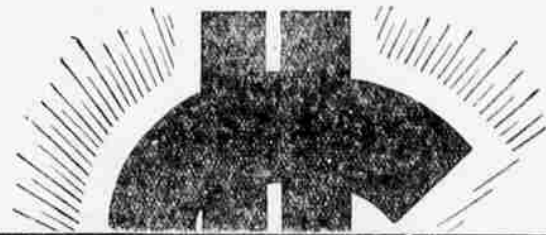
Miss Vera Kernshaw and Mariann Walters visited at Lake Creek Tuesday.
