WOMENS CLUBS BUILDING MANY COSTLY HOMES

Report Shows 1000 Clubs Own Meeting Places—Others in Joint Ownership of Property.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(Special)—Information recently gathered and compiled by the General Federation of Women's Clubs concerning clubhouses, discloses that women's clubs are doing for club homes do not build permanent homes. From the figures given it is shown that two-thirds of all clubhouses were built in the last decade; also that nearly 1,000 clubs own their individual homes; that 67 more homes are jointly owned by several clubs and that 257 other clubs have permanent places of meeting.

Beach House Value
A total of 540 individual clubhouses have an indicated value of \$18,759,189. This figure is considerably below the value of all club house property as in many cases the returned questionnaires omitted this information. While most of the houses owned jointly are the joint property of women's organizations, not infrequently are the joint owners women's and men's organizations.
