The Richardson brothers, of whom only one, William E., survives, began the development of this Yaqui valley delta forty years ago. Mr. Richardson with his partner, H. A. Sibbet, continues, it. John Hays Hammons, and the late Harry Payne Waitney, operated the irrigation project, the Mexican government bought it for nine million dollars. American money, and very intelligently controls the waters.

It is not possible to exaggerate the agricultural value of this farmer's paradise. A devout Arab visited Mecca, located upon the Gaaba stone whence Mohammed mounted to heaven on his white mare, and then the Arab put out both his eyes, saying he could never see anything else worth while and did not want to forget what he had seen. A farmer might do the same, having seen this valley. Professor Mackay, of University of California, who planted a grapefruit orchard here for Mr. Richardson in 1912, should see it now. The grapefruit, bright yellow, are literally as big as the head of a man wearing a hat number six and one-half.

Francisco Almas, governor of Sonora, in which this delta is located, gave land to the Mayo Indians, saying "they deserve it" and lent them money to develop irrigation. They repaid the loan from their rice crop in two years. Fifty thousand acres here are planted in wheat. It is said to see wheat and rice straw burned, tens of thousands of tons, to get rid of it, when you pay twenty to thirty dollars a ton for straw in New York. A farmer could talk and write forever about this land, but human beings are more interesting than the land. First you see, and most important, a brand new public school where 472 little girls are taught by excellent teachers. Its principal teacher is Miss Carmen Conza. The school is named in honor of Carlos M. Calleja, an honorable teacher, who taught the governor of Sonora years ago. The school desks were bought in New York City. Pictures on the walls include Lincoln, Washington, Obregon, Costilla, the Mexican Washington, Colonel Lindbergh and the Philadelphia Liberty bell.

Among men from foreign countries that helped develop this delta

is Z. O. Stocker. Born in South Carolina, he lived eighteen years in Atlanta, Ga., nine years in San Antonio, Texas, and has lived thirty-two years here. He is a patriotic American, but says this is the place. Olof Hahlquist is one of the first twelve men that ever planted rice in California. He is a Swede. The other eleven associated with him in the Sacramento valley were Danes. He agrees with Mr. Stocker that this is the greatest piece of land on earth, and adds, that Charles the Twelfth, of Sweden, was the greatest man that ever lived on earth. It would please you to see that powerful Swede, chest at least fifty-six inches.

Karl Feuchter, from Wurttemberg, who makes every kind of farming pay, talks only German and Spanish. H. C. Grigsby, from San Jose, Calif., farms five thousand acres. He has the finest home in the Yaqui valley. James J. Ryan, U. S. A., worked for the Richardson brothers for seventy-five dollars a month, eighteen years ago. Now he owns one thousand acres, rents fifteen hundred more, and is worth one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

Heinrich Matzen, locally known as Enrique, uses up his spare time threshing piles of rice straw a second time and taking an excellent profit. Because the first threshing is done carelessly, his results would surprise poor Ruth, gleaming by hand in the fields of Boaz. This Yaqui valley, sixty miles long, forty-five miles wide, runs perfectly level west to the Pacific ocean. You should see this west coast and the rest of Mexico. The Mexican nation could feed one hundred million more people and have room and food left for other millions.
