BUTTER FIRM ON BETTER DEMAND; EGGS EASING OFF

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 24.—(AP) Wholesale butter and egg quotations opened unchanged today. Tone of the butter trade was firm with demand active and receipts barely sufficient. Egg market was easy, receipts liberal and demand fair. Three new offerings entered the fresh fruit and vegetable market. New broccoli from Roseburg district was offered at \$1.50 to \$1.60 a crate. A fresh shipment of Walla Walla spinach was quoted at \$1.00 a box, 5 cents below former range. New hothouse radishes, 5 dozen bunches to the box, moved well at 60 cents a dozen. Head lettuce in liberal supply from California was offered at 25 cents reduction, \$2.25 to \$2.50 a crate.

 NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Bulls, rested by the holiday, began the new week with even more violent exertions today. Prices were hunched up 1 to 10 points in the most active trading of the new year, boosted the days turnover to the \$2,900,000 share point. Heavy profit taking ensued after a temporary reversal during the afternoon, but a fresh bull drive, centering in utilities and some of the specialties, carried the market up swiftly in the final few minutes. Shorts were driven to cover in Eastman, which surged up about 10 points, and Westinghouse Electric and Standard Gas about 6. American and Foreign Power, Columbian Carbon and Standard Gas gained about 5 points. U. S. Steel, however, ran into considerable selling, and closed only a little higher, after making an extreme gain of nearly 2 points, and recording a new top since October.
