HERBERT ALFORD GIVEN WRITE-UP IN EUGENE PAPER

Herbert L. Alford, formerly of Medford, now residing in Eugene, was the subject recently of a "daily feature to make Lane county people better acquainted," written by Marian Lower, in the Eugene Register Guard.

The article, entitled "Among Our Neighbors," follows: "Herbert L. Alford is manager of the Eugene office of the Associated Oil company. He is also well known here for his musical interests as a member of the Eugene Gleemen and as one of the quartet from the Gleemen and the Rotary club.

"Mr. Alford came to Eugene about a year and a half ago from Medford. He has been with the Associated Oil company for eleven years, having previously served there in Medford and Grants Pass. "He is a native of Oregon, born at Medford, July 6, 1884, and is descendant of a pioneer family of Oregon. His mother was Rachel Applegate before her marriage. Applegate brother of the well known Applegate brother who came early to Oregon. His father is M. D. Alford, who was born near Harrisburg. His parents still make their home at Medford.

"Mr. Alford finished his public school work at Medford and then went to Stanford university, where he specialized in mechanical engineering. When the world war came Mr. Alford went into service for two years. He was with the seventh coast artillery, then as instructor at Camp Meigs out from Washington, D. C. then with the 325 motor transport company and at Camp Mead. Before the war Mr. Alford worked for the Anglo-London-Paris bank in San Francisco. He was also with the Wells-Fargo company in San Francisco for a time.

"Besides his activities with the Gleemen and the quartet, Mr. Alford is chairman of the Y. M. C. A. active membership campaign, is chairman of the tourist committee of the local Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Eugene Rotary club, the Elks lodge, and Theta Xi fraternity at Stanford. "When working and tennis are his special hobbies along with music, and he has a little shop fixed up for his woodwork. "Mr. and Mrs. Alford make their home at the Osburn apartments. They have one son, Richard Alford, 5 years old."

RADIO CHAINS OF COAST MERGED IN PROGRAM SERVICE

Merge of radio stations affiliated with the United Broadcasting company and the Northwest Broadcasting system will go into effect immediately with program service to the entire group starting Sunday evening, according to an announcement today at the local station, KMED is affiliated with the United Broadcasting company of Los Angeles.

The stations added are KPQ, Wenatchee; KGA, Spokane; 5000 watts; KJR, Seattle, 5000 watts; KEX, Portland 5000 watts and KYA, San Francisco 1000 watts.

Sunday evening, starting at 9 o'clock and continuing for one hour, KMED will feature the best programs originating at KJR in Seattle. This makes possible the local reception of a series of programs that have proved popular with KJR fans.
