MANY WANT JOB AS STOREKEEPER AT CRATER PARK

Since the announcement was published in The Mail Tribune less than a week ago that a civil service examination would soon be held to fill the vacancy at \$1800 per year, of storekeeper at Crater National park headquarters, Earl York, local secretary of the commission, has been fairly deluged with men and boys, who call on him at the postoffice to make personal application, and when told that they must take a competitive examination, eagerly take away with them information and other blanks, which they must fill out in making formal application to enter the examination.

In all, eighty such applicants had called on Mr. York by last night, and today there were more like callers. This is independent of those who made their application direct to the secretary of the Civil Service commission headquarters in Seattle for this district. A day or so ago Mr. York ran out of application and information blanks, and had to send to the district headquarters for more.

Perhaps the bombardment of personal applications would cease if the men or boys desiring to enter the competitive examination knew that the age limit for the applicants is from 18 to 50 years, and that each man to otherwise qualify for the entrance examination must have had at least 6 months' active experience in a warehouse, or similar line of work.

Mr. York estimates, considering the qualifications prescribed, that only about 25 of the persons who made personal calls on him are eligible to take the examination. However, he has not heard from headquarters yet just how many applications have been sent there and passed upon.

The date of the forthcoming examination has not yet been named, but it is presumed it will be held early in July. It is known that several employees of Crater National park are among those seeking to take the examination.

HORSEBACK JAUNT PROMISED SCOUTS ATTENDING CAMP

Boy Scouts at their Lake of the Woods camp this year will make a trip that many people pay large sums for at dude ranches according to Oscar E. Hoover, scout executive.

The boys are to be taken on a two-day horseback trip through the very heart of the Cascade mountains under the guidance of Don Hamlin, an attorney at Klamath Falls who is an experienced horseman. They will carry dehydrated foods and as little equipment as possible so that no pack animals will be needed.

Camp will be made early enough in the district where good fishing will be assured and those who care to take their fishing tackle will have an opportunity to fish. This trip gives boys an opportunity to learn something about the handling of horses, packing and making camp.

Boy Scout camp this year will be held for two distinct periods of two weeks each. They are from July 6 to 20 and July 24 to August 3. Boys wishing to attend camp will be required to register at the scout headquarters, during the week before July 6, and full equipment lists will be furnished them in addition to final camp instructions.

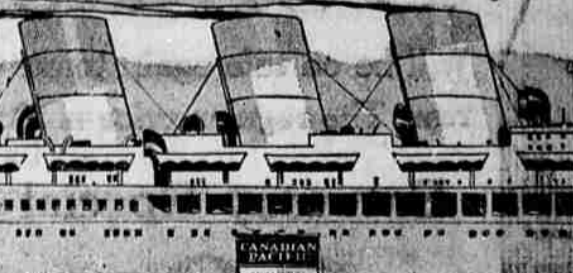
