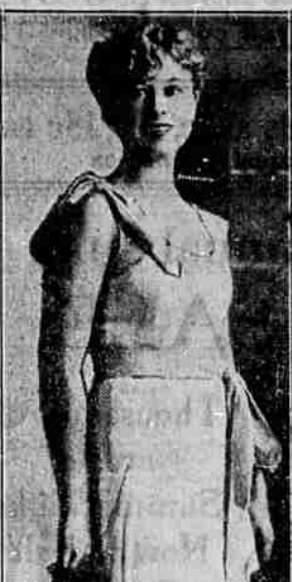
PLAN ENTERTAINMENT FOR RAILROAD AGENTS

The American International Telephone & Telegraph Co. is making an alliance with that powerful Swede, Ericson, who owns great enterprises all over the world, and knows how to make them pay.

Mrs. Irene Frances La Porte is dead, doctor says, "occupational radium poisoning, developing into sarcoma of the pelvis, killed her."
