ASHLAND HOLDING PASSION PLAY TO SUNDAY EVENING

ASHLAND, Ore., June 20.—(Special)—Beneath starlit skies, in the most beautiful natural amphitheatre to be found in all southern Oregon, the third presentation of the Freiburg Passion Play, by 36 members of the cast of the Freiburg, Germany, play, assisted by 100 extras, in costume, and a chorus of 125 voices with orchestra accompaniment, will be repeated this evening, while a fourth performance will be given tomorrow (Sunday) evening.
