

BIBLE MIRACLES DUE TO QUAKES SCIENCE CLAIMS

Evidence Collected Anent the Walls of Jericho and Crossing of the Jordan Uphold Theory.

LONDON, June 20.—(UP)—Material evidence of two of the most spectacular miracles of the Bible has been gathered by British archaeologists, according to messages from Palestine.

Professor John Garstang, leader of the Jericho expedition financed by Sir Charles Marston, has reported that the collapse of the walls of Jericho before the Jewish hosts under Joshua was apparently due to an earthquake. He based his theory upon the discovery that the wall of the city had fallen outward in places in a manner which suggested seismic disturbances.

The same natural phenomenon accounts for the drying up of the Jordan for the Jews to cross, he believes. The expedition, he says, has discovered that the clay banks of the river caved in near El Damieh at about the period described in the Bible.

Sir Charles Marston, who has financed three expeditions to confirm the authenticity of Bible records, believes this naturalistic explanation of the miracles really corroborates the biblical description.

NEW CRACKING PLANT ASSOCIATED OIL CO.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—After an extensive construction program started last November, the Associated Oil company began operation June 15 on their new cracking plant located at the Avon refinery. It is known as the tube-and-tank process of cracking and this installation, having a daily charging capacity of 10,000 barrels, is claimed to be the largest of its type in the United States.

The plant is a complete unit consisting of cracking furnace and bubble towers, treating plant and power plant, and the most modern equipment which has been developed in the cracking industry has been utilized.

In addition to added capacity of the refinery, the new process will serve the purpose of extracting the maximum yield of gasoline that it is possible to obtain from a barrel of crude oil.

Emperor's Fruit Ripens
POTSDAM, June 20.—(UP)—The gardens at Sans Souci Palace, where Frederick the Great used to indulge his hobby for raising exotic fruits, have again started to bloom and are attracting thousands of visitors. The terraces remain as they were then. The hot-houses are so built that they catch the sunshine most of the day. Figs, oranges, and almonds still ripen in the garden. They bore fruit for the first time in 1766.

BUSY BOSTON WAY BUILT ON GRAVE LOSES SHOES ON BET WITH BARBER

BOSTON, June 20.—(UP)—Millions of pedestrians have traversed School Street, in Boston's business district, during the past half century without realizing that beneath them was a tomb.

Workmen engaged in excavation work near King's Chapel dug into the hidden burial chamber, which was found to hold several skeletons. A coffin plate discovered in the vault bore the inscription "Francis Gray, 1861, Aetate 80."

The records of the historic chapel, dating back to 1749, contained no reference to the tomb. It is thought the tomb originally was on the chapel lawn and is now under the sidewalk because of a long-ago relocation of School Street.

GRAHAM-PAIGE SHOWS BIG GAIN FOR MAY

May shipments of the Graham-Paige Motors Corporation set a new high record for the year with an increase of 53 per cent over April, the company announced today. Overseas shipments increased 66 per cent, while Canada showed a gain of more than 20 per cent.

The introduction of the new Prosperity Six, with which Graham entered the field of low priced cars, had immediate effect in increasing the company's sales activities. The production schedule was increased twice during the month, and the factory went on a five-day week basis instead of four. At the Graham body plant, the working day was increased from 6 hours to 9 hours.

All models of the Prosperity Six are now in production, but the supply has not been equal to the demand. The June schedule calls for the same production rate as was maintained in May.

Singing Beach Regains Voice
MANCHESTER-BY-SEA, Mass., June 20.—(UP)—Singing Beach apparently is slowly regaining its voice. Winter storms carried away most of the musical sands which emitted strange noises when walked upon.
