CUT IN SALARY O.S.C. FACULTY ONLY SOLUTION

Kerr to Tell Education Board Voluntary Reduction Is Sole Means of Meeting Reduced Budget

COVALLIS, Ore., June 22.—(AP)—It was said here today that President W. J. Kerr of Oregon State college will inform the state board of higher education, meeting in Portland, that a reduction of salaries of faculty members at Oregon State college, agreed upon voluntarily by those whose salaries will be cut, is the only means of meeting necessary budget slashes. Definite recommendation for a uniform reduction in salary will be made by the president, it is understood, at today's meeting. It was said the decision to take this step was reached after a review of other possible savings revealed it would be impossible to meet the necessary reduction otherwise without stripping instructional work or major functions and discontinuing what are considered vital services in the experiment station and extension service. Faculty members expressed a willingness to take a salary cut, it was declared, rather than throw out entire departments or cripple state service in trying to meet reductions made necessary under the referendum of more than a billion dollars.

FINAL ARGUMENTS IN SCHOOL CASES HEARD BY COURT

A jury in the circuit court at 3:45 this afternoon returned verdicts in favor of the Butte Falls school teachers as follows: Mrs. Rhea Hoover for \$1285, she sought \$1354; William Joe Nee \$1530, she sought \$1800; Mrs. Lena Nee, \$1285, she sought \$1350; and Leola Staddard for \$1530, she sought \$1850.

Final arguments to the jury were delivered this morning, in the suit of William Joe Nee, and three other former Butte Falls teachers, against the district for non-fulfillment of contract. Each seek \$1350 alleged due.

Attorney Porter J. Neff made the closing argument for the school board, and declared "the teachers guilty of open defiance of the state school law." He alleged the pedagogues connive to secure their contracts, beyond the time the county boundary board called a meeting and the time they held it, to "evade the law and nullify any cut the boundary board might recommend."

Attorney Neff held that the claim of the teachers they did not know of the intended action, "was a display of most unusual ignorance." He argued that all residents of the Butte Falls section were well informed on all angles of the school controversy.

Attorney George M. Roberts, counsel for the school teachers, in his argument called Attorney Neff's argument "a brilliant peroration," and held "that a contract was a contract."

"This world was all aflame back in 1914, because Germany regarded a contract to preserve the neutrality of Belgium, as a scrap of paper."

The court completed instructions to the jury shortly before noon.
