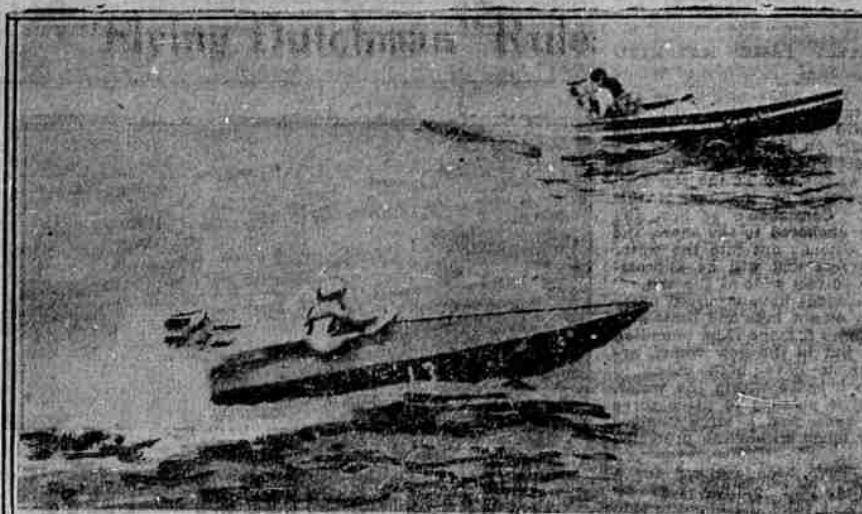

PORTLAND PRO IS NORTHWEST OPEN CHAMPION

Eldred Zimmerman Defeats Neil Christian by Stroke in 18-Hole Playoff — Amateurs Start Tourney

TACOMA, Wash., June 22.—(AP)—Following the crowning of Eldred Zimmerman, 23-year old, assistant professional of the Multnomah Golf club, Portland, here yesterday as the 1931 Pacific Northwest open champion, men and women amateurs of California, Oregon, Washington, Montana and British Columbia stepped into the fray today for a six-day session of ball bashing.

By the narrow margin of one stroke Zimmerman secured a victory over Neil Christian, professional of the Waverly Golf club, Portland, in an 18-hole playoff match yesterday to win the coveted title and the \$400 prize money. Zimmerman breezed around the Tacoma country and golf club par 72 course in 72 and Christian in 74.

Many Amateurs Enter
The largest field of men and women amateurs in the history of the Pacific Northwest golf association tournament was entered for the qualifying round today for the amateur championships. Up to last night 167 women and 113 men were entered for the Simon Pure show and several more were expected to sign up this morning.

Match play will get under way tomorrow and continue until Saturday with the women joining the men Thursday after the field has been cut down.

Zimmerman and Christian finished in a dead heat Saturday with 298 each for the 72 holes in the open tournament and they played off their first place tie yesterday with the former springing a surprise by defeating his fellow townsman and former open champion.

Dr. O. P. Willing, Portland, won the amateur honors in the open Saturday when he garnered a total of 297 for the 72 holes.

FRENCH NET STAR ELIMINATED FROM WIMBLEDON RACE

WIMBLEDON STADIUM, England, June 22.—(AP) Henri Cochet, the world's leading tennis player, was eliminated from the Wimbledon championships today by the comparatively unknown Nigel Sharp, of Great Britain in straight sets. The scores were 6-1, 6-3, 6-2.

Frank N. Shields, leader of the United States Davis cup squad, won his first round match, defeating P. D. B. Spence, of South Africa, in straight sets. The scores were 6-1, 6-1, 6-2.

John Van Ryn, of Philadelphia, also advanced easily to the second round, defeating F. Schaeffter, of Yugoslavia, 6-1, 6-2, 6-1.

Sidney B. Wood, Jr., romped thru his match with R. Singh, of India, for the third American straight set victory 4-1, 6-2, 6-2.

FERRELL'S BAT AIDING ARM IN WINNING GAMES

Cleveland Pitching Star Boasts Average of Over .300 in Stick Duty—Hits Come When Most Needed

Wesley Ferrell, big right-handed mound ace of the Cleveland Indians, not only is winning his share of games on the hill, but he is batting well above the .300 mark and often hitting 'em when they count.

Yesterday he not only held the mighty Washington Senators to seven hits in a duel with Alvin Crowder but he won the game with a home run, his fourth of the season. Ferrell hit for the circuit in the seventh inning, breaking a 1-1 tie. In the next frame Morgan hit another homer to make the final score 3-1.

Brother Also Good
Wesley's brother, Rick, who catches for the St. Louis Browns, also hit a homer yesterday to assume one of the featured roles in another surprising baseball tale. His four bagger aided the Browns in winning their second victory of the day over the New York Yankees. St. Louis took the first game 9-7 despite Babe Ruth's 13th homer, Lou Gehrig's 14th and one by Lazzari to break a nine frame scoring streak. Cards will continue their clouting to win the second, 8-2.

The defeats of Washington and the Yanks put the Philadelphia Athletics in a safer place than they have held for the past few days. The A's won their fifth straight game, nosing out Chicago 6 to 5, and increasing their lead to four games. Boston won the other American league clash, beating Detroit 7-6 by means of Earl Webb's homer in the seventh inning.

Caris, Braves Divide
Among the National league leaders the situation also became less tense as St. Louis improved its position with an even break in a double header with the Boston Braves. Frankhouse and Brandt stopped the Cards with five hits to win the first game 5-2. Wes Schumacher, former Oregon State college star athlete, knocked in three of the Braves' runs. St. Louis got the same number of blows off Socks Seibold, but Young Pepper Martin came through with a homer behind Grimes' equally good hurling and St. Louis won the second, 1-0.

Two errors in the eleventh enabled the Pirates to overcome the effects of Grantham's four misplays earlier in the game and win 4-4 from the Giants. Philadelphia kept an even ten in its private race with Pittsburgh for sixth place by beating Cincinnati 7 to 1. Brooklyn continued its steen chase of the leaders by beating the Chicago Cubs, 7 to 6.

Class D—O. M. Peck, Spokane, in Flying Mammy IV.

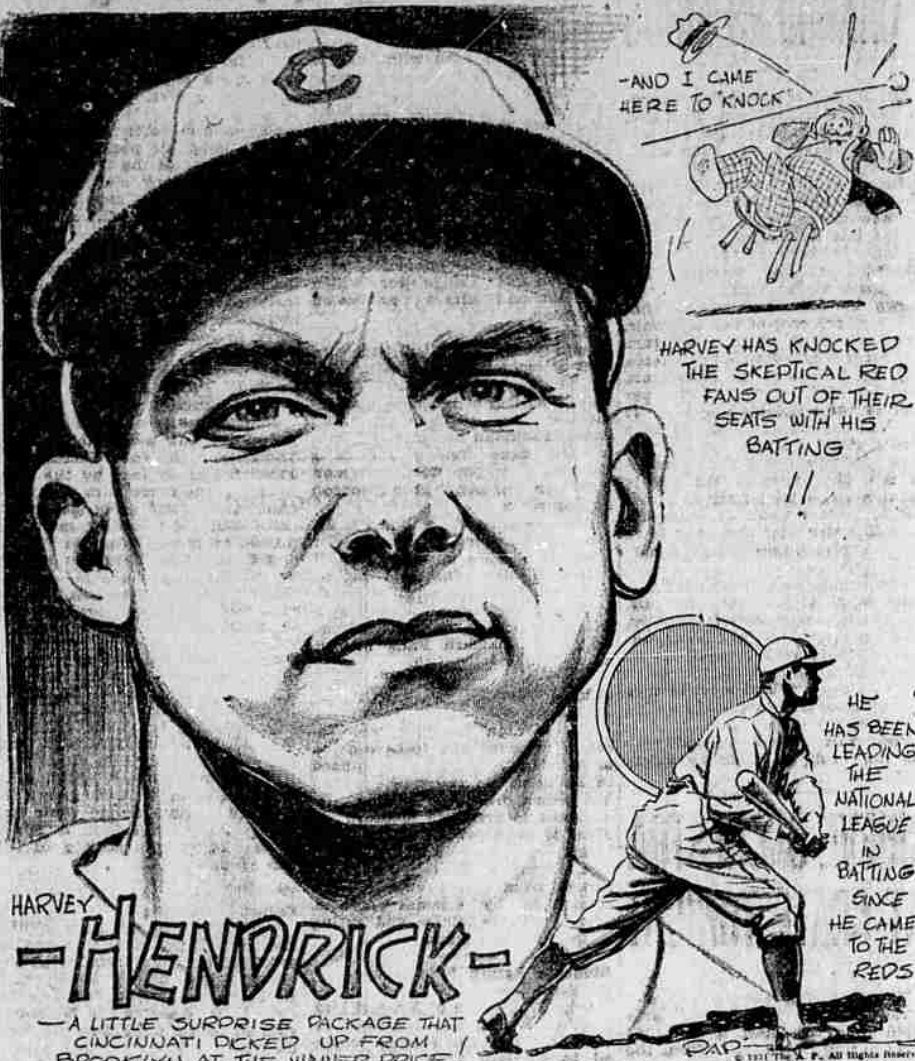
