

Portland Golfers Hold Edge in Northwest Amateur Play

SEVEN STARS FROM OREGON IN SCRAMBLE

Rudie Wilhelm Leads Field for Medal Honors With 150 Gained in Wild Rain Storm—Willing Has 154

TACOMA, Wn., June 23.—(AP)—Match play was only starting in the Pacific Northwest amateur golf tournament here today but it already began to look like an all-Portland semi-final windup.

Thirty-two of the 154 entries qualified over 36 holes in a wild rainstorm yesterday with Rudie Wilhelm, Portland, leading the field for medal honors with 74-75-150.

Seattle qualified the largest number of golfers with eight but Portland landed the cream of the stars, totaling seven.

Stars Qualify

Besides Wilhelm who was twice Pacific Northwest amateur champion, and runner up this year in the Oregon State amateur, the Oregon city was represented by Dr. G. F. Willing, Eddie Hogan, defending champion, Johnny Robinson, Frank Dolp, Jimmy Bushong and Dr. M. Rosenblatt and they were well scattered in the draw.

The best of the rest of the cities of the Pacific coast had to pit against this great Portland band of niblickists was Johnny Shields, Seattle, Washington State title holder; Alec Duncan, Seattle; Harold Brynjolfsson, Victoria, British Columbia champion; Freddie Wood, Vancouver, former British Columbia title; W. K. Yost, Tacoma; George Shaw, Los Angeles and Tom Telfer, Berkeley.

Weather A Hazard

Yesterday's wind and rain played havoc with stars and unknowns alike, and Wilhelm's 150 for the 36 holes was a great score in spite of the fact that this was eight over par. Puddles of water on all the greens made putting virtually impossible.

Robbins finished second to Wilhelm with 78-77 for 155. The defending champion, Hogan, followed in a tie with Brynjolfsson with 153. Dr. Willing and Wood each counted 154. Duncan was next in line with 154 and Dolp posted 157. Shields came back with a nice round of 74 in the afternoon after taking 84 in the morning to total 158.

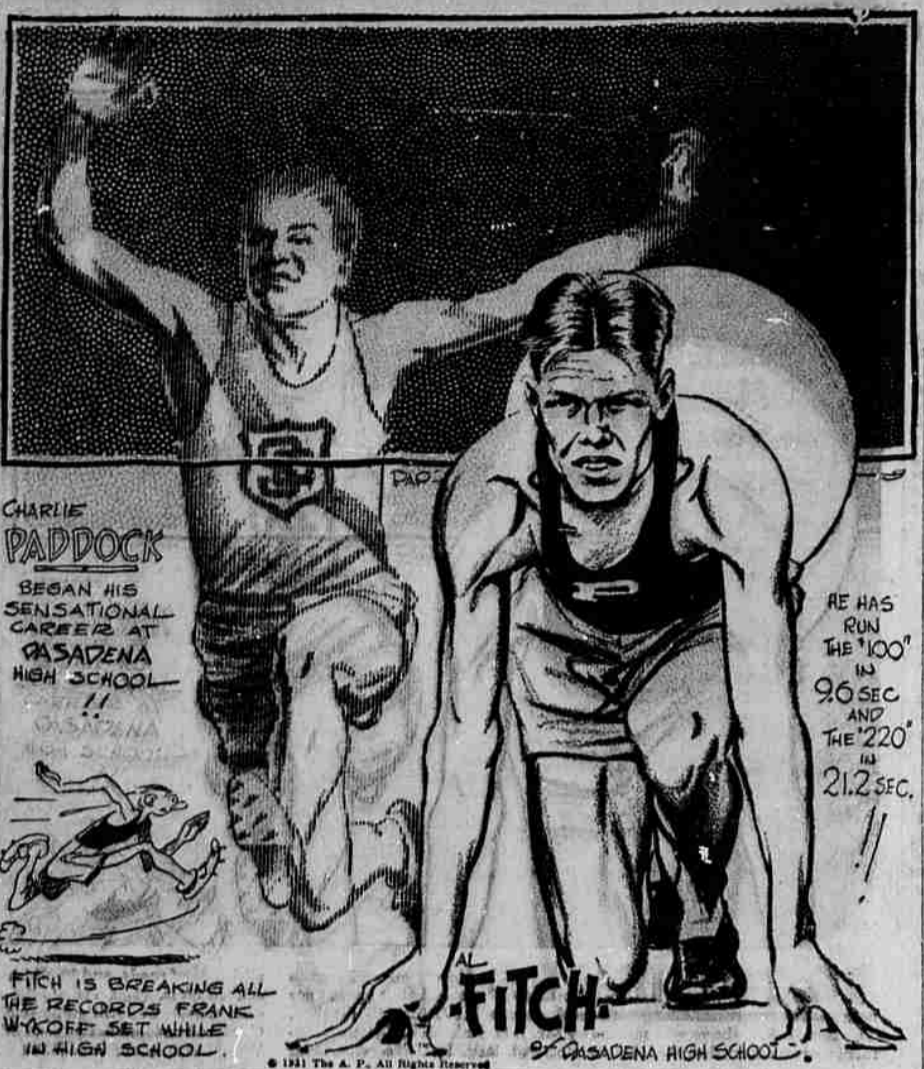
Mrs. Eva Has 85

CHISOX ROOKIE HANDS CHAMPS 9 TO 2 DEFEAT

Frasier, Erstwhile Cotton Tiller, Rewards Patience of Employers—Rajah's Home Run Aids Cubs

A year ago Vic Frasier was spending most of his waking hours following a brace of mules down the cotton rows on his farm in east Texas. He had jumped the Chicago White Sox some months previously for the simple reason that he found himself lonesome in the midwest metropolis.

Yesterday the husky young right-hander turned the Philadelphia Athletics back with six hits and helped his teammates bat out an 8 to 2 victory over the world champions. His double in the fourth with the bases loaded drove in the winning runs.

Perfect Control

The White Sox, it appears, are about to be rewarded for their patience with Frasier. He had perfect control yesterday, issuing not a single pass and striking out three Athletics.

Rookie pitchers, incidentally, have handed the A's two of their four defeats this month.

Yesterday's defeat cut a half game from the champions' lead as rain held the Washington Senators idle at Cleveland. The third place New York Yankees, further in the race, the result of a 14 to 10 drubbing from the St. Louis Browns.

Red Sox Win Second

Danny MacFayden pitched steady ball in the pinches to give the Boston Red Sox their second straight over Detroit, 7 to 2.

The St. Louis Cardinals continued to encounter grief in the east. Jumbo Jim Elliott, pitching his third game in five days for the Phils, handed the National League leaders their fourth defeat in their last five games. Homers by Chuck Klein and Pinky Whitney featured the 7 to 3 triumph.

Rogers Hornsby hit his eleventh homer of the year with two on to help his Chicago Cubs plaster the Giants 11 to 4 and climb within a game and a half of second place. Hack Wilson also did his specialty and Hemsley hit one in the ninth when the Cubs scored six runs. Guy Bush did the flinging.

Fast On Paths

For the second time this year, fancy base running by Fresno Thompson enabled the Brooklyn Robins to pull out with a tight one. He stole third base in the tenth inning and scored on Babe Herman's roller to Grantham to give the Flatbush flock a 3 to 2 decision over Pittsburgh.

A scheduled game between the Reds and Braves at Boston was postponed.

BEAVERS GAIN TIGHTER GRIP SECOND PLACE

Two Big Innings Give 9-3 Win Over Solons—Oaks Invade Beaver Stronghold for Ensuing Weeks Series

A little tighter grasp on second place in Coast league standings resulted from the Portland Beavers' 9 to 3 victory over Sacramento last night in the only game in the circuit.

Two big innings brought the Beaver win. In the sixth inning they overcame a 3 to 1 Senator lead by scoring five runs on five singles and a double. In the eighth they added three more. The game was played to make up in part for a scheduled double header which was rained out Sunday. The series ended with three victories for each team.

Stars Consistent

The Stars lose an occasional game, but last week, like several others past, they took their series and increased a firm hold on top place.

There were few other changes in the standings. Portland remained as the Stars' closest rival but in several games behind the leaders in second place, San Francisco climbed from fifth to third place as the Missions slid from third to fourth, and Los Angeles went down from fourth to fifth. Outdoor Life ON SCREEN AT GAME BANQUET
