## FEWER BRIDAL CANDIDATES ON WALES HORIZON

Royal Marriages, Political Upeavals Reduce Field—Four Princesses Are Eligible by Tradition

By Ralph Heinzen (United Press Staff Correspondent) PARIS (UP)—With the rapid succession of royal marriages and the political earthquakes, which have put a half dozen thrones on skids in recent years, the field of possible brides for Edward, Prince of Wales, has been reduced from a sizeable number to but four princesses of reigning houses, eligible by tradition of the British throne, to wed the heir.

The four possible, but hardly probable, princesses of Wales are: Eudoxia, a housekeeper, Princess Eudoxia of Bulgaria, 33, brunette, and an excellent housekeeper, sister of King Boris; Princess Juliana of Holland, 22, blonde and brawny; she likes to ride a bicycle in the palace gardens.

Princess Maria Francesca of Italy, 17, the prettiest of the four—brunette and gay.

Princess Ingrid Victoria of Sweden, 21, tall and blonde; Ingrid is a cousin of Astrid, duchess of Brabant, and ranks with her as the most stately princess in all Europe, just like the pictures in fairy tales.

Edward had choice. Ten years ago when Edward of Wales was first looked upon as a marriageable youth, he had his choice. There were dozens of royal princesses available and every chancery sought to foment a marriage with the British heir.

Gradually revolutions and marriages have reduced the field and the recent troubles in Spain cut off two more possibilities, for if the prince marries a foreign princess she must be of a reigning family, otherwise he is free to marry an Englishwoman.

Taking the remaining field, it would seem that the chances of Ingrid-Victoria were best, for the British throne, when in doubt, has often turned towards Scandinavian courts before. Princess Ingrid has that rare beauty which comes from a blending of French warm blood with that of old England, for her mother was Margaret of Connaught, a royal princess of Great Britain.

## SCOUTS URGED TO REGISTER NAMES FOR CAMP PERIOD

Boy Scouts of Medford troops are urged to start registering for summer camp at headquarters, since the first two weeks' period of camp opens July 6.
