

COUNTY ASSESSED COSTS OF CARING FOR INSANE FOLK

Jackson county yesterday received formal notice from the state board of control that the cost of caring for inmates of state institutions would be borne direct by the counties, instead of the state as in the past. This means about \$18,000 a year additional outlay to the county.

Another bill affecting this county was also promulgated in Salem yesterday, an opinion of the state attorney general holding that great war widows, unmarried, are entitled to \$1000 tax exemption. The state tax commission previously held that they were not, and in accordance therewith the county assessor made up his next year assessment. It will now be necessary to go through the tax rolls and make the exemptions.

It is hoped that the counties instead of the state shall dispense funds for the care of inmates in state institutions in no wise lessens the taxes. The county makes the levy and handles the funds on the receipt of a bill from the state. Previously the money was included in the state tax fund and the money was disbursed at Salem.

Jackson county's state tax this year was approximately \$2,000 and the first half of taxes for this amount has been turned over to the state. Many county courts of the state have filed protests against the move on the ground that it is shifting the burden without reduction of cost from the state to the county and by the time the next campaign rolls around will be the high point of orations, showing how the state tax has been reduced.
