HOME BREW GIFT STARTS QUARREL; TROZI PAYS FINE

A grand larceny case growing out of the theft of an automobile and a petty larceny case consisting of the pilfering of groceries from another automobile, both cars parked in the business section, were features in Judge Taylor's court this forenoon, and a liquor case growing out of a Medford man giving away some home made wine to a visitor was also disposed of.

Within almost an hour after he had been seen stealing a car owned by Hubbard Bros. and parked near their store, Paul Payne, 18, of Longdale, Cal., was caught with the car at Grants Pass. In court today he waived examination and was held to the grand jury. For pilfering groceries and a coat, all of the value of \$20, from the parked car of H. Schermerhorn of the Nash Hotel Barber shop, B. J. Lee, who was arrested later by Policemen Cave and Prescott, was sentenced to ten days in the county jail this morning by Judge Taylor. Lee only recently arrived here to join his Indian wife and children at their cabin home. The county and Red Cross had been caring for the family for some time past.

After Officer Cave had been summoned to Stewart avenue late Wednesday night because of a quarrel on that street near the home of George Trozi, an Italian, between Mr. and Mrs. V. E. Rickett after the former had been given four gallons of wine and a bottle of beer by Trozi, which were found by Cave in the Rickett car, both men were arrested.

Trozi, who claimed the wine and beer was made for his own use, was fined \$50 and costs by Judge Taylor yesterday, and the intoxication case against Rickett was continued to a future date to enable him to go to Klamath Falls to take a job there.

STAMINA OF FORD DEMONSTRATED IN STUNT MANEUVER

In a demonstration displaying the dependability of the built-in qualities of the Model A Ford roadster he was driving, Morris Tavlinisky attracted large crowds at the corner of Bartlett and Sixth streets Wednesday evening with his stunt driving and daring maneuvers.

The two-point suspension drop center rims and steel wheels were given strenuous tests by reverse driving, swerving and sliding from curb to curb. Tires on the car were furnished by Red Waters of the Smith and Watkins station on South Riverside avenue, and were free of charge.

The short time that the car was being put through the various stunts would equal between five and six hundred driving hours, under ordinary conditions, according to officials at the C. E. Gates Ford garage, sponsors of the affair.

Tavlinisky has used the Model A car in 37 such demonstrations, and drove the same car in the 24-hour endurance run out of Seattle recently. In the past two and a half years he has driven approximately 250,000 miles in model A Fords.
