NOTED AUTHOR WRITES STORY FOR MAIL TRIB.

Harold Bell Wright wrote his first novel more than 30 years ago without intending that it be published. "That Printer of Udell's" was prepared for delivery as a serialized sermon in a small middle western city.

Friends urged the young pastor-author to give his story to a larger

audience. The book finally was published and Wright began his career as the novelist whose books achieved the greatest sale of any living writer.

His latest story, "Exit," will appear in serial form in The Mail Tribune beginning Monday, June 29.

Although his success as a novelist was assured from the first story Wright continued in the ministry until 1908 when poor health forced his retirement. He now lives in Arizona, devoting much of his time to outdoor activities and extensive travel.

"Exit," his first novel in three years, has its setting in a small mid-western city and is the love story of two generations. The central theme of the story is the presentation of life as a stage, a device which gives particular effectiveness to the development of the plot.

"Exit," is being serialized for the first time. The opening chapter will appear in The Mail Tribune, Monday, June 29.

GITZEN RENAMED STOCK INSPECTOR

Although Max Gehlar, director of the new state department of agriculture, last Tuesday in announcing the livestock inspectors for the 36 counties in Oregon named Dr. G. A. Gitzen, the well known Medford veterinarian, as such inspector for Jackson county, the appointment means a practical re-appointment for him, as for years past he has been the county herd inspector and performed similar duties.

The duties of the inspectors just appointed are to inspect all livestock shipped in and out of the counties, and enforce all livestock quarantine regulations. Their terms are for two years, and their salaries range from \$25 to \$500 a year, each county paying the salary of its inspector.

GO SLOW STRIKE TRIED BY MINERS

PEIPING (UP)—More than 40,000 miners employed by the Mallan Mining Administration at Tonsban, near the Manchurian border, have instituted a "go-slow" strike in protest against the action of mine authorities in closing down the mines two days a week. The company is a joint British-Chinese concern.

A dispute between the company and the Peiping-Mukden railway has caused difficulties which resulted in the order. Coal piled up at the mines in huge quantities during the dispute.
