SEEK IRRIGATION 17,000 ACRES IN JACKSON COUNTY

SALEM, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—Application to appropriate 284 second feet of water from Main creek and the west fork of Evans creek, for the irrigation of 17,000 acres of land in Jackson county, was filed with the state engineer today by Eric Wold and Herman D. Powell, of Medford. This filing was the only one recorded of any proposition during the week. C. E. Stricklin, state engineer announced.

The land for which irrigation water is asked of the state is located in the Evans creek country. It was learned here today, the farmers of the locality are very anxious for the project to be accomplished as the need for water is great. WASHINGTON, June 27.—(AP)—Secretary Mellon must rule before January 1 on whether all Russian commerce is the product of forced or indentured labor.

On that date, the provision in the tariff act of 1930 extending the import prohibition against convict-made goods to foreign articles produced by forced or indentured labor becomes effective.

In making this decision, the secretary will receive strong recommendations to place all Russian commerce under the ban.

NEWPORT, R. I., June 27.—(AP)—Robert R. Hathaway of Fall River, son of a Massachusetts state representative, today was convicted of murder in the first degree in the slaying of Verna Russell, young student nurse, formerly of Portland, Ore., during an automobile ride in Tiverton the night of March 23rd.

BOMB BLOWS HOLE IN ITALIAN PALACE WALL

GENOA, Italy, June 27.—(AP)—A hole about 15 feet in diameter was blown in a wall of the royal palace today and 100 or more windows smashed in a bomb explosion.

Four bombs were exploded, damaging the walls of several buildings. Numerous suspects were arrested.

BANDIT PAIR CONFESS TO DEEDS HERE

Boys Nabbed Soon After Third Robbery—Leading Life of Crime to Show Girl Friends Good Time—Trick Pistol Utilized

Victor C. Marcell, 18 and well dressed, whose home is in Portland, and George A. Pifer, 29, recently discharged from the navy, this morning confessed to the sheriff they held up and robbed the Fatty Ross hamburger stand on North Holly street Wednesday night, securing \$6, and the Bronson service station on the Midway Highway Thursday night, securing \$11.50. An attempted hold-up of Emmett Central, service station attendant last night was foiled.

The two made signed confessions and exonerated two 15-year-old girls and a youth from Eugene, acquaintances.

The boys bandits used a trick cigarette holder, fashioned after a pistol and told the authorities they used criminal tactics to secure money "for food, gasoline and to show the girls a good time."

Went to Ashland. The two confessions are identical in details. Following the robbery of the Fatty Ross stand the pair, with their girl friends, went to a dance and spent the following day in Ashland, returning to this city in the evening and later holding up the Bronson station. After this hold-up they went to Central's pool on the Applegate river.

They spent Friday afternoon attending the movies and on the streets and last night started out to rob the Central station at North Central and Jackson streets. They secured a small sum of money, but Emmett Central, the attendant, had \$20 in his pocket, which was overlooked.

Night policemen Louis Bloom and Thomas Robinson a few hours later picked up the pair on suspicion and found in the rear compartment of their car a visor cap and the trick pistol. They were driving a second hand Packard car with a California license. Pifer had the Mail Tribune's account of the Thursday night robbery in his coat pocket.

Sign Confessions. The youths told conflicting stories and this morning announced their intentions of "coming clean." They readily signed statements admitting their guilt. Marcell is the son of a family in the great, well-known along the Pacific coast as a magician and showman, who lives in Pasadena. The boy's mother lives in Portland.

Pifer met Marcell in Portland and came here with him. They went to the home of a family by the name of Moran, 145 North Oakdale, friends of the Marcell family and roomed there. The latter knew nothing of the boys' operations.

The Eugene youth, acquaintance of the pair, was released this morning, after being held for questioning. He was completely exonerated of any knowledge of the robberies.

The police picked up the pair, on descriptions furnished by victims.

The confessions were made to Joe Cave, city policeman, and Sheriff Jennings, in the county jail.

They will be arraigned for a preliminary hearing early next week, and will come before the forthcoming grand jury session.

As far as the authorities were able to determine today, the present case is the first serious trouble for either.
