

Fluhrer's Boat Runs Wild After Tossing Pilot Into River

REGATTA FANS GET THRILL AT SUNDAY RACES

Meyers in Miss Medford Takes Feature Race — Fast Time — Women Show Ability in Event.



A thousand people, who lined the banks of the Rogue at Savage Rapids dam, got the thrill of their lives yesterday when a joyous speedboat race with a dash of great circles around the east buoy of the course. It was in the first heat of the class D race, one of the feature events of the Southern Oregon Boat club's outboard racing meet, when Heinle Fluhrer, the "Flying Dutchman" at the wheel of "Miss Cecelia" executed a barrel roll and was thrown into the water.

The tiny little "Miss Cecelia" had a scant hundred yard lead on "Miss Klamath," on the seventh lap, when the extraordinary accident occurred. As if sensing that victory was almost within her grasp, the speedy boat righted herself after throwing Fluhrer into the water and sped on around the buoy. Seemingly driven by unseen hands "Miss Cecelia" through the waters in a great arc, bearing down upon the boathouse landing.

Eludes Pursuit — Then, with spectators scrambling to safety, the little boat veered sharply to port and began a series of great circles, making her way between other craft, eluding boats that took up the chase for the buoy and other boats still in the race alike.

After her plugs had become fouled by splashing water, "Miss Cecelia" slowed down and submitted to capture, just as a runaway horse treads and waits for his captors to arrive and make him fast.

Yesterday's races at Savage Rapids were replete with thrilling finishes and novel features. The first time in southern Oregon history, women competed in an outboard race and the feminine drivers proved real veterans.

Meyers Wins Feature — Joe Meyers, at the wheel of "Miss Medford," captured the honors in the 8-lap free-for-all, the feature race of the Southern Oregon Boat club's meet. Joe's time for the eight mile course was 12:50 1/2 minutes. "Miss Albany," with J. Fierstine driving, was second, while Art Peck's "Klamath Queen" sped across the line for third place. The other boats completing the race ended in the following order: "Golden Slipper," an Albany boat with George Hurley driving; "Miss Klamath," a Clatsop entry; Tom Ingram driving; "Madam Queen," "Dutch" Welch driving; "Legionnaire," a Klamath boat, T. Harrison driving; "Cecelia" with Heinle Fluhrer had a slight lead over all the boats when it was forced to drop out with a sheared propeller pin. "Skipper," driven by Art Vroman, dropped out of the free-for-all on the sixth lap.

Welch in Trouble — The first heat of the class D race, the event which was marked with Heinle Fluhrer's remarkable accident in "Miss Cecelia," "Miss Klamath," driven by Tom Ingram of Klamath Falls, won first place in 12:52 minutes. The second place in this 8-lap event was won by George Hurley in "Golden Slipper." Joe Meyer in "Miss Medford" was forced to drop out of the race on the sixth lap with motor trouble. "Dutch" Welch, driving "Madam Queen," was visited by Old Lady Luck and had motor trouble at the very start of the race. On the first round of the race, "Dutch" Welch hit some rough water and made a spectacular leap into the air, narrowly averting a turn-over. When "Madam Queen" hit the water the plugs were fouled.

In the second heat of the class D race, Heinle Fluhrer and his "Miss Cecelia" staged a comeback and slipped across the finish line ahead of Joe Meyers in "Miss Medford" in the fastest race of the day. The time was 12:45 minutes. Tom Ingram in "Miss Klamath" was third and George Hurley in "Golden Slipper" was fourth.

Bohnert Wins — In the stock motor race, a five-lap event, Johnny Bohnert in "Blue Devil" was first. Ed Smith in "Black Friday" was second and Jim Dally in his Dettweiler Dart went out of the race on the third lap. The time was 9:52 minutes. "Blue Devil" captured the 5-lap ladies' race while Little Helen McAllister in "Loaded Bones" was second. "Lucky Boy," driven by Mrs. F. House, was third and "Legionnaire," with Mrs. Art Peck at the wheel, had motor trouble at the start of the event. Mrs. Bohnert's boat was the only class B boat, the others being class C motors. The time for five laps in the ladies' race was 9:24 minutes.

Class C Heats Fast — Both of the class C heats were exciting and good time was made by the winning boats. In the first heat, J. Fierstine in "Miss Albany" won with the time for eight laps being 12:48 1/2 minutes. Art Peck's "Klamath Queen" was second, Joe Meyers in "Miss Medford" was third, Tom Ingram in "Miss Klamath" was fourth, T. Harrison in "Legionnaire" was fifth and O.

Fishing at Diamond lake was fine over the week end, with several limit catches reported. Mr. and Mrs. Jim Murray caught 10 fine fish there yesterday and Ben Charles and Frank H. Bennett returned Saturday, each with the limit of rainbows. The largest weighed 5 1/4 pounds. The two Californians were enthusiastic in their praise of fishing conditions and other opportunities for sports in southern Oregon. Mr. Bennett is the son of Roger S. Bennett of this city.

Fishing was also good in the Rogue Sunday. Several steelhead catches were brought in from the stretch reaching from Bybee to Dodge bridge.

Salmon were also caught in the upper river and trout in numerous mountain streams, the exact location of which the successful anglers refuse to reveal.

A surplus of Chinese pheasant eggs in Oregon has been reported by state game farm officials. The state will furnish these eggs to any farmers or other interested persons who would like to set them and raise a flock of birds. The state will also furnish food for the birds and only asks the farmers to bring and care for them until they are large enough for liberation.

Rupert Henry has received several settings of eggs from Eugene and plans to raise some fine broods at his ranch near this city.

Two of the finest salmon catches of last week were brought from the Rogue near the Elks' picnic grounds by Dr. W. H. Heckman and Carl Weaver.

Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Biden, Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Goff and Mr. and Mrs. Joe O'Brien were members of a party who fished in Big Applegate yesterday. Twenty-seven trout was the result of the day's fishing for the group.

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Williamson and party spent yesterday fishing at Diamond lake, and caught 17 good sized trout.

R. E. Martin of the Airways radio at Medford, who requested a transfer here because he had heard of the wonderful fishing possibilities, reports that he is much pleased with angling, and yesterday caught 15 trout in Rogue river. Following an hour's battle he landed an eight-pound jack salmon also yesterday, with light tackle.

Harrison Wins Heat — In the first of the class B races, the opening events of the meet, T. B. Harrison's "Legionnaire" was first. "Miss Albany" was second, Jackie Terrett's "Loaded Bones" was third. "F. House's" "Lucky Boy" was fourth, "Putt" of K. M. C. Nell was fifth and Art Vroman's "Skipper" was sixth.

"Miss Albany" nosed out Legionnaire for first place in the second heat of the class B division. "Loaded Bones" was third, "Lucky Boy" was fourth, "Putt" was fifth and "Skipper" was sixth.

Some thrilling surf board exhibitions were featured between the afternoon races. Ted Scott of Grants Pass and Harold and Herb Gray of Medford, Parker Hundy was head starter, assisted by Floyd House.

ROBINS REGAIN WINNING STRIDE IN LATE GAMES

Poor Start Gives Way to Winning Streak in Past Two Weeks — Browns Continue Big Splurge.

The Brooklyn Robins, who surprised National league fandom by their splendid showing last season, have had a hard time since then trying to live up to the predictions made about them. Apparently strengthened by off-season trades, the Robins were expected to jump right into the thick of the pennant race, but instead they started off badly and have only recently begun to show what they really can do.

Just about two weeks ago, the Robins began to hit their best stride. Since then they have lost only one game and that was a "hard luck" contest which went to the St. Louis Cardinals despite Vance's three-hit pitching. And they promptly re-venge themselves on the league leaders by finishing the series with four straight victories.

Look Like Champs. — The Robins were the ones who looked like champions yesterday as they easily trounced St. Louis, 10 to 4. Ancient Adolfo Luque gave 10 hits and kept them from doing any harm and thus became the seventh Brooklyn pitcher to go the route in 10 games.

The defeat cut the Cards' margin to one and a half games before the start of a series with the second place New York Giants. The New Yorkers clouted the Cincinnati Reds for a double victory yesterday, winning the first game, 17 to 5, behind a 21-hit attack and rallying for four runs in the sixth inning, to take the second clash 5 to 2.

Braves Take One. — The Boston Braves completed their conquest of the Chicago Cubs by slapping out a 9 to 1 victory in the first half of a double-header. Wally Berger provided the second game feature as the Braves came from behind to earn a 2-2 tie just before the Sunday 6 o'clock law halted the game. He started two double plays from center field, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia were idle.

The St. Louis Browns continued their amazing winning streak in the American league by taking two, 5 to 4 decisions from the Boston Red Sox. It gave them a record of eight straight victories and 11 in their last 12 games.

A's Increase Margin. — Philadelphia's Athletics increased their margin over Washington by two and a half games by winning two games from Detroit while the Senators could get only an even break in two mound duels with the Chicago White Sox. Roy Mahaffey held the Tigers to five hits to win the first game for the A's, 9 to 1, while George Walberg gave them only four to gain a 5 to 1 victory in the second. Al Thomas of Chicago bested Bob Burke of Washington in the opener to win 2 to 1. Each gave six hits. The Senators used some Chicago errors for a start toward a 3-1 triumph in the second game as Brown and Crowder held the Sox to four hits.

Bobo Ruth hits his 17th homerun and Ben Chapman stole his 25th base for the New York Yankees, and the combination helped considerably in a 9 to 5 victory over Cleveland.

Up-state Stars Expected to Enter Lists — Local Talent Headed By Edmiston — Drawing Thursday.

(By John Heddy) With the announcement that a number of upstate players would seek the southern Oregon tennis championship to be played on the Medford high schools courts July 3, 4 and 5, local tennis fans had begun to cast dubious eyes at the home talent and weigh the probability of the large trophy denoting that honor remaining in the near city where it was brought by the busy racket of Jimmie Edmiston, local collegian.

Edmiston will need a delegation of the home guard seeking to keep the supremacy established by Medford in western Oregon tennis circles. At present the local delegation has rather a forlorn hope as a number of the ranking players have retired from tournament competition.

Eye Local Talent — Local players who are looked upon as strong contenders are Bud Deuel, Oregon all-campus champion, H. O. Butler, twice runner-up for the city title, Alvin Tolleson, former Oregon varsity man and high school coach, Carter Roggs, who at intervals has claimed the southern Oregon singles and doubles crown, and the Pruitt brothers, prominent club and tournament players.

The colleges will also furnish a number of contenders for honors. From Oregon, Jimmie Edmiston and Allen Spalding, both frosh numeral men and Allan Carley are looked upon as possible entrants. Ralph Klein, former high school champion, may carry the Stanford colors, while Harold DeVoe, who hails from Oregon State, may make a bid.

S. O. N. S. In Line — Southern Oregon Normal may also have representatives in the field in the person of a brace of Johnnies—Elsan and Redden—who form a strong doubles combination.

There are a number of budding stars rising from the ranks of Medford's junior lists and high school team who will bear watching in the play. Harry Garfield, John Dallaire, Lloyd Sunderman, Ernie Conrad, Dan Wold and Phil Quisenberry are all capable players who may spring a surprise.

All entries must be in before 8:00 p. m. Thursday evening, at which time the drawings will be made. Fees are 50c for singles entries and \$1.00 for doubles. The preliminary rounds must be gotten out of the way by Saturday.

Rally In Final Frame Gives 5 to 4 Win in Opening Game — Three Other Teams Take Double Bills.

(By the Associated Press) Out of yesterday's program of doubleheaders, four Coast league teams emerged with double victories.

San Francisco's Seals, the Hollywood Stars, Portland's Beavers and the Seattle Indians wound up the week's series with a clean sweep over their opponents.

Portland let Oakland down twice by scores of 5 to 4 and 6 to 1. The Oaks led 4 to 1 in the ninth inning of the first game, but the Beavers rallied and scored four times. Oakland couldn't convert any of its 10 hits in the second game, while Portland made six tallies out of seven hits.

Seals Take Two — The Seals' victories were at the expense of San Francisco's other team, the Mission Reds. The scores were 4 to 3 and 8 to 7. In the opener, the Seals collected 11 hits but were unable to score after the first two innings.

The Hollywood Stars ended a disastrous week for their near neighbors, the Angels, by beating them 9 to 3 and 10 to 1. The Angels were the victims of heavy and opportune hitting. In the second game, the Stars scored 19 times on seven hits, including homers by Barbee and Shellenback.

The Indians grabbed a close 5 to 7 game from Sacramento's Senators and then turned around to let them down again by the more substantial score of 9 to 2.

TITLE BATTLE BACKERS SEE NO COIN RUSH

CLEVELAND, June 29. — (AP) — The Stirling-Schmeling world's heavyweight championship fight, dedicating Cleveland's new \$30,000,000 municipal stadium next Friday night, will be no million-dollar affair, but if it draws \$400,000 there will be no walls of protest from the promoters.

This was indicated today when officials of the Madison Square Garden corporation of Ohio declared they would be "extremely satisfied" if the gate receipts hit the \$400,000 mark. Figures revealed for the first time showed \$176,000 in cash already in the bank, with \$88,000 to be added in reservations certain to be picked up.

Although the advance sale is actually \$176,000, the total advance, counting reservations, amounts to \$265,000, thus assuring financial success for the fight. The promoters hope to dispose of another \$150,000 worth of tickets between today and Friday.

EAGLE PT. WINS 12 TO 9 OVER LITHIAN SQUAD

Young pheasants at the Jackson county game farm like their home, apparently, and are not in favor of leaving it, according to reports from the farm today. Trapping of the birds for distribution about the valley has begun and officials report it's going to be a slow business.

The birds take to the trees for their night rest and refuse to come down, at the request of the trappers, who intend scattering all members of the first brood about the valley.

They are catching only two or three dozen a night and 1000 are to be trapped and distributed. This division of the Jackson County Game Protective association is under the chairmanship of Chester Pith.
