

Transcontinental Elk Car Halts for Overnight Visit Here

LODGEMEN HAIL BROTHER FROM EASTERN COAST

Driver Scheduled Reach Seattle for Opening National Convention July 6 — Car Undergoing Test

Mayor E. M. Wilson, accompanied by W. M. Clemenson and E. C. Ferguson, who constitute the official reception committee from the local Elks lodge, motored to Grants Pass this afternoon to meet E. C. O'Donnell, member of the Elks magazine transcontinental tour at 4 o'clock. They will escort him to this city arriving at 5 o'clock at the Elks temple, where a large assemblage will welcome the New Yorker.

O'Donnell is driving a free wheeling Studebaker, President Eight, decorated in the official purple and white of the Elks lodge. The car is equipped with Firestone tires and is running on a definite schedule, which must be completed in Seattle July 6, opening date of the Elks national convention.

With two other members of the lodge O'Donnell left New York May 10 enroute to the national convention. The three representatives are driving Studebaker cars, equipped with Firestone tires. One took the central route, one the northern, and O'Donnell the southern. He spent last night in Redding, California and plans to continue north from Medford tomorrow.

Welcome at Temple

Entertainment in his honor in this city will include an official welcome at the Elks temple and various informal features. Photographs of his car, himself, and the welcoming party will be taken by local photographers and O'Donnell is expected to talk for a few minutes this evening in a program to be broadcast from station KMED. The exact time has not been announced but will be between 7:30 and 9 o'clock.

He brings a message from Governor Roosevelt of New York, given him at Fouchkeepie lodge, just before his departure for the west. Governor Roosevelt is a member of that lodge and extends greetings to the governor of Washington and the 200 Elks lodges to be visited.

The tour is the Elks Magazine annual transcontinental trip and Medford is fortunate in being given an opportunity to entertain one of the three representatives.

O'Donnell is traveling the Redwood highway and is scheduled to arrive in Grants Pass at four. The following hour the appearance of his beautiful Studebaker, decorated in purple and white, will be awaited on the streets of Medford.

Toured Many States

Taking the southern route, O'Donnell has passed through the following states: New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico and California.

An interesting feature of the trip is an authoritative check conducted to prove the remarkable economy of free wheeling. Each car is equipped with a special speedometer which translates engine revolutions into miles. A comparison of the two speedometers supplies the basis for Studebaker's claim of 20 per cent saving in gasoline and oil for free wheeling.

ROOSEVELT IS WETTER THAN SMITH, CLAIM

Advise Southern Democratic Women to Bolt Party if New York Governor Is Nominated for President

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—An editorial characterizing the governor of New York as "wetter than Smith," and calling upon southern democratic women to bolt the party if he is nominated for president, was published today by the Women's Democratic Law Enforcement League.

The article was written by Mrs. Jesse W. Nicholson, president of the league, and appeared in its official organ, "The Woman Voter."

Mrs. Nicholson also assailed Colonel Edward M. House, confidential adviser to President Wilson, who recently conferred with Roosevelt in Massachusetts. Referring to a statement attributed to House that the New York governor would be acceptable to the drys, she said:

What Drys?

"What drys does he mean? The very few southern politicians who supported Smith in 1928?"

At the recent convention of the Democratic Women's league here there were frequent speeches urging an organized bolt from the democratic party in 1932 if the candidate nominated was a wet.

The entire group of delegates, many of whom voted for President Hoover in 1928, called at the White House to pay their respects. In her editorial today, Mrs. Nicholson advised Colonel House to "get the viewpoint of the southern dry women" if he would be "saved from embarrassment later on."

O. M. Spaulding received 14 votes to be elected mayor of Sharon, S. C., a town of 60 people. His opponent received four votes.
