WELLS MEDITATES TRANSGRESSIONS BEHIND THE BARS

Charles R. Wells, a war veteran with a \$32 a month pension from the government, bound over to the grand jury yesterday for alleged theft of an auto, diamond ring, and \$10 from Mrs. D. R. Scribner of this city, who receives \$150 per month from the Indian bureau, sought a reconciliation this morning, as he meditated his fate in a county jail cell.

Wells recently became religious and joined a church, and, according to Assistant District Attorney George Nelson, desires to mend his ways and has besought the complaining witness to forget and forgive.

Mrs. Scribner conferred with the district attorney this morning and was not inclined to consider any compromise. She alleges that Wells slashed her with a penknife, bit her finger, failed to pay for his keep, lost legal papers showing her as owner of the sedan in dispute, and lost the key to the garage containing the auto. According to her allegations, Wells has had a vivid and varied series of affairs with women.

Wells, a giant in physique, was recently arrested for creating a disturbance in the Nash hotel. The district attorney's office says he has been a problem for some time. When bound over to the grand jury late yesterday, Wells, when informed that a conviction for grand larceny carried a prison sentence of from one to ten years, rejoined: "Give me ten years." This morning he had changed his mind.
