WEATHER KEY TO MARKET ON EGGS; MELONS ADVANCE

PORTLAND, July 6.—(AP)—The weather will play an important part in the egg market here this week. There was a good demand prior to the holiday that had much to do with supporting the two-cent rise for last week. If demand slackens without some outside agency, such as the weather, helping this market, it may be difficult to maintain the advance. The outlook as the week opens is for considerably higher temperatures. This will automatically cut down the volume of eggs coming into the market—especially in the extra division. Something like this may be needed to hold the market. Raspberry prices were shaded 15 cents a crate in wholesale trade circles here today. The new price is \$1.10 to the crate. Green beans were going to the trade Monday at 5 cents a pound, compared with 6 cents at the close of last week. Heavier production of field grown cucumbers brought sharp reductions in all cucumbers. Hot house varieties were quoted to the trade at \$1.00-1.15 and field grown were down to 85 cents. Corn receipts from The Dalles showed a sharp pick-up over the week-end. Some of the stuff coming in now is the yellow variety, but a large part of it is white. Corn is going to the trade at 50 cents a dozen ears. Local head lettuce was reduced to \$1.10 for the three dozen dry pack here Monday. Four and five dozen locals were quoted at \$2.75 to the dozen. There was a great deal of snafu and strength to the watermelon market. Only a few cars were available, and buyers were on hand for these. The price was a shade higher at 2 1/4-2 1/2 cents a pound. According to talk in the trade, another advance will be worked before Tuesday night.
